Explore the diverse sights and stunning topography of Tasmania on this introduction to Hobart, its charismatic capital city. Your orientation drive hits many of Hobart's most memorable sights, from the restored whaling warehouses of Salamanca Place, now a thriving market district, to the 19th-century mansions and cottages of Battery Point, to landmarks like the Cascade Brewery at the edge of town, crafting superior ales and lagers since 1824. A trip up to the summit of either Mt. Wellington or Mount Nelson promises crisp air and Instagram-worthy photo opps of the city and Tasmania's coast. Just north of the heart of town, a section known as Queen's Domain is home to the Royal Tasmanian Botanical Gardens, recently celebrating the 200th anniversary of its founding. Enjoy some free time here to explore these tranquil, well-manicured grounds at your leisure. The RTBG's historic plant collections and venerable old-growth trees have earned it recognition as one of Australia's leading botanical conservancies.

Return to Tasmania's colorful past in historic Richmond, a village largely built by convict labor, then get immersed in colorful nature at Bonorong Wildlife Sanctuary. A brief, scenic drive into the countryside brings you across Australia's oldest bridge and into the area where Tasmania was first settled. You'll see the spire of St. John's Church from Richmond Bridge, just one of the lingering reminders of the devout 19th-century settlers who first brought Christianity to this island. Dating from 1824, well-preserved Richmond village still boasts fine Georgian buildings made of native sandstone, the handiwork of conscripted convict labor. These days, visitors are free to roam the galleries, shops, and cafés now housed in those same venerable structures at will. You, too, will have time to explore at leisure. Don't forget to bring your favorite camera; this place is outstandingly photogenic. So are the residents of your next stop, Bonorong Sanctuary, where you'll be invited to get up close to some of the country's most legendary wildlife. Top on the list is the endangered Tasmanian devil, but wombats, koalas and free-roaming kangaroos round out the roster nicely. Knowledgeable park guides can provide fascinating background on this fascinating and often downright bizarre menagerie.

- ·Travel by coach into the countryside around Hobart, a region rich in history, flora and fauna.
- Cross a graceful stone bridge built in 1823 to visit one of Tasmania's earliest-settled villages.
- Browse the cafes, shops and galleries of Richmond, housed in Georgian sandstone buildings dating back to the convict era.
- Enter a world of free-roaming roos, plump wombats and rare Tasmanian devils at Bonorong Wildlife Sanctuary.
















# HBA-010 PORT ARTHUR GHOST TOUR

Ramble through Port Arthur's historic district at night and hear spine-chilling tales of the ghosts that many people claim to have seen there. With only a lantern for illumination, the guide will lead you to some of the district's most notorious and supposedly haunted places. Much of the paranormal activity is said to have occurred in the 19th-century penal colonies that the British built for its most hardened criminals. Some of them died from unspeakable cruelty and their ghosts may still be wandering about. People have seen unexplained white mists hovering in the cells, eerie silhouettes floating in the barred windows and transparent dogs scurrying down the hallways. Enigmatic sights and mysterious lights have been documented in Port Arthur since the 1870s, when a reverend noted a series of strange events at his parsonage. Whether you believe the stories or not, the nighttime adventure will be eye-opening and perhaps hair-raising.

- ·Walk through supposedly haunted Port Arthur at night with only a lantern for light.
- ·Listen to spine-chilling tales at sites where paranormal activity is said to have occurred.

Observe the night sky from a mountain lookout away from Hobart's ambient light, a magnificent setting that maximizes the celestial views. You will ascend Mount Wellington at sunset, as the sky comes alive in an endless sea of brilliant stars. The air around Hobart is pollution-free and among the world's cleanest, which makes the viewing from this elevated front-row seat even better, especially on a cloud-free evening. Although you can easily make out the constellations with the naked eye, they will look brighter and more spectacular through the provided binoculars and telescopes. The guide will point out some of the most well-known constellations. Depending on the conditions and time of the year, you may see the Milky Way or the aurora australia, the vivid spectacle known as the Southern Lights. You may also catch sight of constellations that aboriginal Tasmanians hold culturally and spiritually significant.

- ·View the canopy of stars and constellations from atop Mount Wellington.
- ·Use the provided binoculars and telescopes to maximize the view of the night sky.
- Scan the sky as you wish or focus on the celestial bodies that the guide will identify.
- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing. Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

This tour includes a moderate amount of walking. It is not available to guests who utilize a wheelchair. Those guests with mobility concerns are cautioned to evaluate their personal level of ability and stamina. Please note that stargazing is weather dependent and cloud cover at Mount Wellington is unpredictable. Casual, weather-appropriate clothing and comfortable, flat walking shoes are suggested.

# **DUD-001 THE TAIERI GORGE RAILWAY EXPERIENCE**

Step off the ship and onto one of the world's most scenic railways as you journey through the spectacular Taieri River Gorge. Welcomed aboard by a friendly crew, settle into your carriage and get ready for a breathtaking trip into a landscape only accessible by this train. First tracing Otago Harbor, then traversing suburban Dunedin and a fertile plain, you'll soon be climbing into the sheer cliff faces and plunging ravines of the Taieri River Gorge. Much of the ride takes place high atop soaring stone-and-lattice viaducts that early engineers, masons and railway gangs somehow managed to build through extremely challenging wild New Zealand terrain. The fact that they succeeded is a true marvel – which you get to experience firsthand today. As you relax and watch in awe, your carriage will pass one unspoiled panorama after another, winding its way through the gorge over dramatic bridges suspended high above the placid river below, and through no fewer than 10 tunnels carved out of solid bedrock. Photo op stops will be made along the route and you'll enjoy a morning tea and light picnic style boxed lunch while on board. Your journey concludes at Dunedin Railway Station, a suitably grand Victorian landmark.

- ·Settle back and experience one of the world's most breathtakingly scenic railway journeys.
- Travel over countless latticed-steel and stone bridges and through 10 tunnels as you traverse the rugged Taieri River Gorge.
- Take it all in from the civilized comfort of your carriage with morning tea and a light lunch served.
- ·Capture stunning photos from several stops made during the trip.

#### **DUD-006 TAIERI GORGE RAILWAY AND OLVESTON HOUSE**

Travel through some of New Zealand's most spectacular countryside on a legendary railway, then see how Dunedin's elite lived over 100 years ago at a historic estate. Not far from the pier, you'll board the famed Taieri Gorge Railway for an unforgettable trip into a landscape only accessible by this train. Your seating will be in either a beautifully restored 1920s carriage or a contemporary car with large windows and open platforms for panoramic viewing. The roundtrip journey takes you past sheer cliff faces and plunging ravines, over the Taieri River curved bridges and stone viaducts, through mountain tunnels, and across an everchanging landscape ranging from fertile farmland to forests of towering kahikatea trees. Commentary will be provided throughout the trip, as you learn about the region's early pioneers, wild gold rush days, and other New Zealand lore. Along the way, you'll be treated to a morning tea and a boxed picnic-style lunch. Disembarking the train back in Dunedin, you'll travel briefly by coach to Olveston House to tour this lavishly furnished English Arts & Crafts-style residence from 1906. Now a museum, the gracious 35-room house still contains hundreds of paintings, rare artifacts and photographs collected by its original owners.

- ·Settle back and experience one of the world's most breathtakingly scenic railway journeys.
- Travel over countless latticed-steel and stone bridges and through 10 tunnels as you travel through the dramatic cliffs and ravines of Taieri River Gorge.
- ·Take it all in from the civilized comfort of your carriage enjoying morning tea and a boxed picnic-style lunch.
- Back in Dunedin, tour a 1906 home brimming with fine art, intriguing collectibles and Arts& Crafts style.
- Return to the pier, following the scenic route through downtown and along the Otago Harbor shore.
- ·Wear weather-appropriate clothing.
- ·Flat, comfortable walking shoes are recommended.
- ·Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

This tour includes approximately one hour of easy-to-moderate guided walking. Guests must be able to negotiate 4 steep steps to enter and exit the train car. The train ride is 6 hours in duration. The tour is available to wheelchair quests who have a collapsible chair, are able to make their own way on and off the coach and train and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. Those with mobility concerns are cautioned to carefully evaluate their personal level of stamina before participating. The coach portion of this tour may operate with a driver/guide.













# **DUD-005 NATURE'S WONDERS WILDLIFE SAFARI**

Travel out to the far tip of wild Otago Peninsula and encounter tiny penguins, plump fur seals, and nesting seabirds on an all-terrain tour of remote headland bluffs and beaches. Skirting Otago Harbor's north shore past Sawyer's Bay, Roseneath and St. Leonard's, your coach will round the bend at Dunedin and continue out along the craggy peninsula coast to Natures Wonders, a family-run touring farm in the epicenter of what is arguably the most precious wildlife habitat in New Zealand. You'll travel by mini-coach for part of the tour, and 8-wheel-drive Argo vehicle for the rest. The route will bring you from the farm's high point 659 feet above sea level all the way down to the water's edge and back up, passing breathtaking sights and viewpoints along the way. Watch a breeding colony of New Zealand fur seals basking on the rocks and swimming in the ocean pools, see breeding colonies of spotted shag cormorants nestled on a rugged cliff face just above the crashing Pacific waves; and take a shoreside ride to Penguin Beach, where you'll be able to observe little blue penguins, and if you're lucky, spot some very rare and shy yellow-eyed penguins as well.

- ·Enjoy a scenic drive along Otago Harbor, through Dunedin and out to the far tip of Otago Peninsula.
- Visit the family-run farm, Natures Wonders, in the midst of spectacular headland bluffs and remote beach habitats.
- ·Tour this majestic wild terrain by both 8WD vehicle and mini-coach, descending from 650-foot sea cliffs down to the water's edge and back.
- Anticipate encounters with wildlife at its most undisturbed basking fur seals, spotted shags on the nest, fascinating little blue penguins and perhaps even shy yellow-eyed penguins.
  - Returning via Dunedin, enjoy a brief highlights drive through this city of elegant Victorian landmarks.
  - ·Wear weather-appropriate clothing; include a warm, waterproof and windproof jacket.
  - ·Flat, comfortable walking shoes with non-slip soles are recommended.
  - Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

This tour includes limited walking but can involve uneven and at times muddy terrain. Your vehicle will travel over bumpy and dusty roads. The tour is not recommended for guests with back, hip and/or neck problems, or limited mobility. Wildlife sightings vary by season and migratory patterns and are not guaranteed. Guests will use two modes of transport at the farm, 8WD Argo vehicle and mini-coach, switching halfway through the tour. This tour does not operate with a separate guide, but rather with a driver/guide.

#### **DUD-GG2 OROKONUI ECO SANCTUARY & OTAGO WILDLIF**


Become familiar with New Zealand's native wildlife at an eco-sanctuary and see how injured animals are rehabilitated at a wildlife hospital. A predator fence surrounds the sprawling Orokonui Ecosanctuary, allowing the indigenous animals there to live free from invasive species that could alter the environment and jeopardize their safety. Within this idyllic natural setting, you may observe turataras, rare kiwis and saddleback birds endemic to the South Island. The sanctuary's goal is to create a healthy, self-sustaining ecosystem that mirrors New Zealand long before outside species were introduced. The Wildlife Hospital in Dunedin primarily treats sick or injured indigenous species, especially those under threat of extinction. They can range from small birds to sea lions weighing hundreds of pounds. As you watch the veterinarians provide care, you will hear moving stories about animals that they have saved and released back into the wild. You can expect it to be an inspiring experience.

- ·Observe some of New Zealand's rarest and most endangered indigenous species .
- Appreciate how the Orokonui Ecosanctuary protects New Zealand's vulnerable animals.
- ·Watch veterinarians treat sick and injured native species for release back into the wild .
- ·Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- ·Wear flat comfortable walking shoes .

This tour includes approximately 2 hours of walking over uneven terrain with several steps. Participants should be in good physical condition. The tour is not available to wheelchair guests or guests with mobility concerns. Weather appropriate clothing including a light jacket; hat; sunscreen; sun glasses; and flat, comfortable, closed-toe walking shoes are required. Guests are unable to handle the animals at the wildlife hospital. Minimum age to participate is 14 years of age and children under 18 must be accompanied by an adult parent or guardian.

Enjoy a relaxed orientation tour of Dunedin, home to some of New Zealand's most elegant Victorian architecture, its oldest university and its first public botanical gardens. Second largest city on the South Island, central Dunedin sits deep within beautiful Otago Harbor. Your picturesque coach drive from the pier traces the harbor's shore, passing charming Sawyer's Bay, Roseneath and St. Leonard's on the way into the city. A tour of the grand Jacobean house known as Olveston provides a remarkably well-preserved glimpse into the refined Dunedin life circa 1906. Set on an acre of wooded land, this graceful 35-room residence is the epitome of English Arts & Crafts style and still contains the marvelous artwork and artifacts collected by its original owner. Continuing through the city, you'll pass many more landmark structures including the Law Courts, Otago Boys High School and First Church, the Edwardian mansions of Royal Terrace and High Streets, and Gothic Revival-styled Otago University, founded in 1869 and as vital as ever. Spanning 69 manicured on a hilltop, magnificent Dunedin Botanic Gardens are older still, but – just like the university – thrive today. Enjoy free time for strolling here and be sure to visit the classic Winter Garden Glasshouse.

- Enjoy a sightseeing drive to central Dunedin from the port, tracing beautiful Otago Harbor and its towns.
- ·Tour a 35-room home that features fine art and intriguing collectibles, perfectly capturing the style of this city known for its worldly elegance.
- Travel along streets lined with Edwardian and Victorian mansions, churches and cathedrals, and the Gothic campus of New Zealand's first university.
- Stroll among camellias and rhododendrons, roses and splashing fountains in an 1863 botanic garden.



This tour visits two iconic Otago Peninsula sights, one a rookery and the other a castle. Skirting the harbor's north shore and charming towns of Sawyer's Bay, Roseneath and St. Leonard's, your coach will swing through Dunedin city proper on a brief orientation spin, passing the hilltop botanic gardens and University of Otago campus. Rounding the inner tip of the harbor, you'll head out onto the rugged Otago Peninsula to the Royal Albatross Center, where you'll be escorted to the Observatory after an informative intro at the Reception Center. Access to the colony is strictly controlled, with every measure taken to protect these rare birds' natural habitat. With wingspans up to 10 feet they seem ungainly on the ground – but watching one glide by in flight is a uniquely spectacular and exhilarating experience. Your visit to Larnach Castle will deliver a distinctly more civilized thrill. This impressive stone mansion, set amidst trees and colorful gardens, dates from 1885 and boasts many elaborate features including a graceful hanging staircase and intricately carved ceilings, hallmarks of the many English and Italian artisans who built it. Your time here includes a lovely luncheon, guided house tour and free time in the gardens.

- ·Enjoy a scenic drive along the harbor shore, through Dunedin and out to rugged, wild Otago Peninsula.
- Travel to the Royal Albatross Observatory, site of the world's only mainland albatross nesting site.
- Visit the natural habitat where you can observe these amazing seabirds up-close maybe even see a few soaring by on 10-foot wingspans.
- Tour the no-expense-spared mansion known as Larnach Castle, built for a wealthy 19th-century banker by a small army of European artisans.

Sample the beers made at a landmark Dunedin brewery and delve into the region's natural history at the Otago Museum. Speight's Brewery, a Dunedin icon since it opened its doors in 1876, has done as little as possible to change with the times. Still in its original eight-story location above a natural spring that imparts trademark flavor to its wares, this gravity-fed brewery is one of just two in the world still using an open-style vat to create beers from the original recipes. Sampling several varieties, you'll find some that deliver a distinctive 19th-century tang. A stop for lunch at a nearby alehouse more often than not involves fresh cod fried in batter made with Speight's beer. Then it's on to history of another type as you browse the Stories of the South exhibit in the Otago Museum, showing how this region's magnificently rugged landscape has shaped the lives of all who've settled here. The museum also boasts the world's largest collection of extinct moa skeletons and the country's largest fossil, a 23-foot-long aquatic plesiosaur. Your return trip to the pier includes a photo stop at the much-celebrated Dunedin Railway Station, built in checkered Edwardian Baroque style in 1906.

- ·Tour an iconic gravity-fed brewery that's been making its beer the same way since the 19th century.
- Sample a range of their beers, including some that really do have a delicious ancient taste.
- Browse the exhibits at the Otago Museum, where this region's natural and cultural history are shown to be connected.



- ·Embark on a relaxed cruise out Otago Harbor to Taiaroa Head, a famous magnet for marine wildlife.
- En route, get background on the area's rich natural history from the captain and seasoned deckhands.
- ·Enjoy rare close-up views of the captivating animal life along this rugged coast including some 10 species of breeding seabirds, including the very rare Royal Albatross.

Head into the hinterlands of the Banks Peninsula with a professional forager to look for edible plants in nature's boundless pantry. The found ingredients will depend on the location for your adventure, which varies with the season. You never know what the forager will stumble across in the wild because New Zealand boasts more than 7,000 plants suitable for foraging. Commonly found salad ingredients include crunchy sweet pea tendrils, wild radishes and red clover flowers. If the forager wades just off shore, he will likely find green-lipped mussels and pie crust crabs. Fragrant lemonwood leaves and peppery horopito are often used to enhance the flavor of seafood. Although most of the items will be indigenous, you might come across wakame, an edible seaweed that was introduced in the 1980s, when it was inadvertently brought in on the hulls of ships. The forager may also suggest fun ways you might forage for food when you return home.

- Discover a remarkable variety of plants and marine life suitable for foraging .
- ·Learn fun ways you might forage for natural ingredients upon returning home .

Over the past two decades, Sea Cleaners has removed about 100 million pieces of litter from New Zealand's coastline. Yet, trash continues to accumulate, most of it washing into the sea with the storm water run-off. The ocean currents then deposit the trash along the shore. That's where volunteers such as you come in. You will cruise on a Sea Cleaners vessel to a section of coastline that needs to be cleaned. Plastic commonly washes up, and it is particularly harmful because plastic often kills marine life that mistakenly ingests it. As you collect and bag the debris, members of the Sea Cleaners will elaborate on how they encourage residents to recycle and properly dispose of their trash, so it doesn't end up in the ocean.

- ·Help protect Lyttleton's fragile environment by cleaning trash from the shoreline .
- ·Learn how Sea Cleaners works with volunteers to make positive changes year-round .

Gray with black-and-white markings, these petite cetaceans are often seen leaping and frolicking around these waters. You'll also see ample evidence of the harbor's violent, volcanic origins. This entire sheltered body of water lies in the caldera of an extinct volcano. Your journey will reveal that much of the jagged coastal terrain left behind now serves as nesting habitat for marine birds such as spotted shags, white-fronted terns and several species of gulls. After about two hours on the water, you'll return to the pier with a keen understanding of this scenic New Zealand seaport.

- Spend a couple delightful hours cruising picturesque Lyttelton Harbor by catamaran and discover the history and wildlife that inhabits these waters.
- Enjoy colorful commentary as your skipper points out landmark sights and recounts stories from the early Maori and European settlers.
- ·Learn of the harbor's dramatic geological heritage, go in search of tiny dolphins, and see coastal terrain where abundant seabirds gather and nest.
- ·Wear casual, weather-appropriate clothing including a light jacket or sweater.
- ·Flat, comfortable walking shoes are recommended.





After a devastating earthquake in 2011, parts of downtown were declared uninhabitable because the ground had become permanently unstable. For an up-close view of the natural world that now flourishes in these former urban areas, you will follow a city arborist deep into the Red Zone. You will see the remains of earthquake-damaged homes that native bush has reclaimed, utilities now blanketed with vegetation and abandoned roads. It will be inspiring to see how nature is healing the landscape that the earthquake leveled. One of the more interesting aspects is to view the remnants of gardens that were once well-tended now growing wild, side by side with native bush. The arborist will describe how the Red Zone was established and what can be expected in the future as the vegetation continues to thrive.

- ·Explore the Red Zone, where wild vegetation has taken over former urban areas .
- ·Walk with an arborist that will point out the highlights and describe the native bush .
- Gain insight into the 2011 earthquake that left parts of Christchurch uninhabitable .

Head off-road into the unspoiled wilds along Wellington's southern coastline to observe a thriving colony of fur seals in their natural habitat. The landscape around here certainly qualifies; it's craggy, hilly, and lots of it is inaccessible to anything short of the kind of rig you're riding in. You'll travel southwest along a fault line that runs the length of the North Island, treated to jaw-dropping views of the surrounding mountains and even those of the South Island across Cook Strait. Your destination: Tongue Point, a rocky spit of land jutting into the sea, where you'll drive onto the beach and into a seal bonanza. Once on the brink of extinction, now-protected fur seals have made a steady comeback. Their hallmarks are visible external ears, pointy whiskered snouts, and delightfully social and animated behavior. You'll have more than two hours to watch them interact here on the rocky shore and regularly head into the sea to cool down. Able to dive underwater for as long as 11 minutes at a time, they are spectacularly nimble in the water.

- ·Head out from the pier by specially-equipped 4WD, bound for the very southern tip of the North Island.
- Revel in spectacular views, including all the way across windy Cook Strait, as your driver follows a fault line out to wild Tongue Point.
- Now down on the rocky beach, spend over two hours observing a thriving colony of fur seals in their natural habitat.
- ·Watch in fascination as these plush-furred, highly social marine mammals interact on land and dive into the sea to hunt for fish, squid and octopus.
- ·Wear casual, weather-appropriate clothing; include a light jacket or raincoat.
- ·Flat, sturdy walking shoes are recommended.
- ·Bring a hat, a bottle of water from the ship, and sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

Walking on this tour is over sandy beach and rocky surfaces. You will have that opportunity by cruising the crystal-clear seas on a glass-bottom boat and then swimming at Goat Island Marine Reserve, the country's first such reserve. If the tide is out, even somewhat, you can observe all sorts of fascinating marine creatures in the tidal pools. The seas were once overfished, but now teeming with life, proof that the country's conservation effects have been successful. Nearby, you will find The Riverhead, thought to be New Zealand's oldest tavern and an ideal place for a refreshing summer drink.

On a clear day, the range is about 50 miles – but even watching fog up here is an amazing experience.

Visit thrilling natural wonders like a cavern illuminated by glowworms and a forest of giant kauri trees, and see several man-made attractions, too. Kawiti Caves contains plenty of bizarre and impressive stalagmites and stalactites, but its most wondrous sight is the galaxy of blue-green lights given off by thousands of tiny glowworms attached to the inky-black ceiling. It's a spectacular sight and your guide will share fascinating facts about the lifecycle of these famous little New Zealand residents. The denizens of Puketi Forest are a bit larger – like, say, 150 feet tall and up to 2,000 years old. Rivaling the California redwood in height and girth, thousands of mighty kauri trees once cloaked the Bay of Islands. The reserve you'll tour is one of the last protected areas where they still stand, and the boardwalk through the forest allows visitors to admire these gargantuan wonders up-close without damaging their sensitive roots. A side trip to colorful Kawakawa adds levity to the day, with its train tracks running down the main street and whimsical public restrooms designed by an Austrian artist. A photo-stop in front of New Zealand's oldest building and its 1830s stone storehouse in Kerikeri provides the history.

- Enjoy a guided tour of Kawiti Caves and see the brilliant light show created by thousands of tiny glowworms attached to cavern ceiling.
- Stroll along a boardwalk path through the towering kauri trees of Puketi Forest reserve.
- Visit Kawakawa, where the vintage railroad runs through downtown and the public restrooms are... colorful.
- Stop in Kerikeri for photos in front of two of New Zealand's oldest, most historic missionary structures.

**BAY-GG1 BAY OF ISLANDS & SEA CLEANERS**

Join members of the Sea Cleaners organization to pick up debris in the Bay of Islands and learn about the devastating environmental effects of litter. Over the past two decades, Sea Cleaners has removed about 100 million pieces of litter from New Zealand's coastline. Yet, trash continues to accumulate, most of it washing into the sea with the storm water run-off. The ocean currents then deposit the trash along the shore. That's where volunteers such as you come in. You will cruise on a Sea Cleaners vessel to a section of coastline that needs to be cleaned. Plastic commonly washes up, and it is particularly harmful because plastic often kills marine life that mistakenly ingests it. As you collect and bag the debris, members of the Sea Cleaners will elaborate on how they encourage residents to recycle and properly dispose of their trash, so it doesn't end up in the ocean.

- ·Help protect the Bay of Islands' environment by cleaning trash from the shoreline .
- Learn how Sea Cleaners works with volunteers to make positive changes year-round.
- ·Feel a sense of satisfaction and achievement for participating in the clean-up .



Discover the stories and places tied to New Zealand's early Maori and European history during a scenic journey to Kerikeri and Waitangi. Your discoveries begin with a drive to the coastal town of Paihia, where one of the earliest British missionary stations was established in 1823. Some 16 miles away in the lush citrus growing area of Kerikeri, see the missionaries' first permanent dwelling, Kemp House, built even earlier. Just adjacent is the Stone Store, the mission's long-surviving stone storehouse. But the most renowned North Island cultural touchstone you'll visit on this tour is back in Waitangi – and built of imported Australian wood. The recently-restored Waitangi Treaty House is the site where the first 43 Maori chiefs signed over sovereignty of their lands to the British Crown in 1840 - with many others to follow as the treaty circulated around the islands. Though much debated, the Treaty of Waitangi is still governing race relations and land rights in New Zealand today. On a stroll through the pastoral Treaty House grounds, you'll encounter an impressively carved Maori meeting house and a seriously long war canoe. Once at the property's end, rejoin your transportation for the ride back to the wharf.

- ·Travel to historic landmarks where New Zealand's Maori and British history has taken place.
- See an early missionary station in Paihia, and visit the even earlier Kemp House in Kerikeri, next to the country's oldest stone building.
- Take a self-guided tour of the iconic building where representatives of Queen Victoria and 43 Maori chiefs signed the Treaty of Waitangi in 1840.
- Walk the Treaty House grounds and see an impressive Maori meeting house and war canoe.
- ·Wear layered, weather-appropriate clothing.
- ·Flat, comfortable walking shoes are recommended.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

This tour involves approximately 100 yards of walking to the Kemp House and Stone Store and another 700 yards of mostly downhill walking at the Waitangi Treaty House and grounds. There are 12 steps in the Stone Store to access the 1st floor, which may be skipped. Visit to the Waitangi Treaty House is self-guided. The tour is available to wheelchair guests who have a collapsible chair, are able to make their own way on and off the transportation and have an able-bodied companion to assist them. Those with mobility concerns are cautioned to carefully evaluate their personal level of stamina before participating.









**BAY-002 KAYAKING ON WAITANGI ESTUARY**

Paddle the tranquil waters of Waitangi Estuary on a scenic kayaking tour that visits mangroves and waterfalls. Your seasoned guide will walk with you across the Waitangi Bridge to the kayak launch for a safety briefing and gear-up before heading out into the estuary waters. Working your way through this beautiful natural setting, you'll glide by a low forest of mangrove trees, their glistening root systems protruding out from beneath the water to create a crucial breeding ground for many species of small fish. This protected habitat is a crucial component of not only the estuary but the whole Bay of Islands ecosystem. After a time, you'll reach Haruru Falls, surrounded on one side by the lush Waitangi Forest. The falls themselves, while not especially high, are nonetheless a spectacular sight when seen from the water like this, especially if any recent rainfall has added oomph to their volume. Take a rest break and enjoy the light refreshments served at a nearby picnic area before the relaxed paddle back to Waitangi Wharf.

- Enjoy a guided paddle by tandem kayak into Waitangi Estuary, where the river joins the bay.
- Glide along normally calm waters past ranks of deep green mangroves whose exposed prop roots create an essential breeding habitat for small fish.
- Reach the end of the estuary at Haruru Falls, not always mighty but always magnificent from the water.
- ·Step out onto land and relax awhile over supplied light refreshments at a picnic area near the falls.
- ·Refreshed, make the return paddle to Waitangi Wharf.
- ·Wear a bathing suit under shorts or a cover-up; bring a jacket in case conditions change.
- ·Waterproof beach shoes are recommended.
- ·Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

The Waitangi Estuary is normally very calm and well protected; however, it is recommended that quests have previous kayaking experience. Strong winds can make the kayaking challenging. This tour is not available to wheelchair guests and not recommended for those with limited mobility. There are approximately 400 yards of walking from Waitangi Wharf to the kayaking center. Participants must be at least 10 years old and accompanied by a parent. Double kayaks are

Okiato was the first capital city – but only for two years until Auckland took over. Omata, once a favored arrival point for European immigrants, is now a favored wine-growing region. As you encounter these and other sights, you'll savor a traditional New Zealand lunch and learn much about the Bay of Islands' evolution from rustic frontier settlement to top-shelf travel destination. Once you dock at Russell, enjoy an hour of free time to explore independently before the return to Waitangi. Long known by the unfortunate moniker of "Hell Hole of the Pacific," Russell was the original lawless whaling, sealing and trading port on the North Island – notoriously inhabited by crusty mariners, deserters and convicts on the lam. Today, it's a delightfully picturesque time capsule, rich with history and meticulously restored mid-19th-century buildings - with musket ball scars.

- Enjoy a sumptuous shipboard lunch as you cruise through the beautiful waters of the Bay of Islands.
- Pass by about fascinating sights along the shoreline like Okiato, New Zealand's earliest capital, and Omata, once an immigration port, now a winegrowing center.
  - Pull in at Kororareka, now known as Russell, the largest whaling port in the southern hemisphere during the 19th century and the most lawless.
- ·Enjoy an hour of free time here to explore at your leisure before the return sail.
- Discover a picturesque waterfront village of historic restored homes, churches, and wooden cottages.
- ·Wear casual, weather-appropriate clothing; include a light jacket or sweater.
- ·Flat, comfortable walking shoes are recommended.
- ·Bring a hat, a bottle of water from the ship, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.
