Later, you'll journey on to stately Cahir Castle, an impressively preserved medieval stronghold on a rocky island in the River Suir. Encounter fascinating history and handsome crafts in medieval Kilkenny, and pay a call on the renowned House of Waterford Crystal. About an hour from Waterford by coach, Kilkenny's origins span back more than 1,500 years – and its marvelous skyline reflects the prowess of 11th- and 12th-century Norman stonemasons. Most splendid of these ancient buildings is Kilkenny Castle; on your self-guided inside tour, you'll encounter Dutch master portraits, fine antiquities and captivating stories about events that transpired within this medieval fortress-turned-residence. You'll also have free time to explore more of

Kilkenny on your own. The Kilkenny Design Center is a great candidate for a visit; here under one roof you'll see the very best in Irish design and workmanship, its gift offerings carefully curated from over 200 studios and workshops around the country. A relaxed lunch will be served at a traditional local hotel before journeying on to the Waterford Crystal visitors' center. While the city's original crystal factory closed up shop in 2009, limited production is still conducted in Waterford, and this new exhibition and showroom takes you through the fabrication process – with impressive finished pieces on display to browse or purchase.

OVERVIEW
See Ireland's oldest city with new eyes after this up-close guided walk filled with impressive sights and lighthearted commentary. First settled as a Viking trading port 1,100 years ago, Waterford also has deep Norman roots – and your knowledgeable guide will share colorful facts and stories about the city as you amble in and out of key landmarks along narrow, winding streets. The historic Waterford City center is barely 30 minutes by coach from the modern port yet seems like a completely different world. Your walk here includes encounters with six national monuments, and visits inside several of them. Among those are the three iconic venues that make up the storied "Viking Triangle": Reginald's Tower, Ireland's oldest intact building; the Bishop's Palace, home to the only surviving mourning cross from Napoleon's death and the world's oldest piece of Waterford crystal; and the Medieval Museum, a modern structure wrapped around very ancient ones, and chock full of rare and precious historic treasures. In addition, you'll have free time to discover Waterford a bit further on your own before returning by coach to the pier.

OVERVIEW

Browse the magnificent residence of the 9th Marquis of Waterford, whose family has owned Curraghmore House and thousands of surrounding acres for more than 800 years. The estate exudes history. As you approach the main house, be sure to notice the statue of a stag with a crucifix between its antlers—the family symbol—atop the old castle. Many of the interiors feature extraordinary plaster work, period furnishings from different centuries and an abundance of personal family memorabilia. The property’s Shell House was built almost entirely with colorful shells that one of the 18th-century residents persuaded ship captains to collect from around the world. Other highlights include the oldest bridge in Ireland, a Sitka spruce that is one of the tallest trees in Ireland and an exquisite Japanese garden. You will see more spectacular sights on the return drive along the Copper Coast, a naturally beautiful stretch of road so geologically significant that UNESCO deemed it a Global Geopark.

- Tour a grand estate that has been owned by the same distinguished family for 800 years.
- Browse the exquisite interiors and exteriors of buildings such as the enchanting Shell House.
- Take in the natural beauty while driving the Copper Coast, a UNESCO Global Geopark.

Continuing west from here, the cliff road traces a more rugged coastline as it passes through colorful, charming villages like Fenor, Annestown and Boatstrand in a region known as the “copper coast” for the mines that once thrived here. Circling inland, the route heads for the impressive Comeragh Mountains, the rocky backbone of the county, then transitions to fertile farmland terrain as you approach Waterford City. During your journey, you’ll have a chance to sip a cool beverage and experience traditional Irish entertainment at a character-filled local pub. After all, what outing in Ireland doesn’t include a pub or two?

OVERVIEW

Enjoy a leisurely jaunt along the Disert Circular Walk, a 2-mile trail that loops through the foothills of the gorgeous Bluestack Mountains. The scenery will be breathtaking the entire way, but especially at the vantage points that offer sweeping views of Donegal Bay. The trail encircles a national monument graveyard and holy well dating to the times of St. Colmcille, a 6th-century abbot that become one of Ireland's three patron saints. If you'd like to visit the historical monument, you can follow a short trail spur that will also take you by a tributary of the Eany Beg Water. The Bluestack Mountains aren't particularly high, but the range is extraordinarily beautiful. A sense of peace seems to pervade the landscape, a quality that attracted religious pilgrims centuries ago. Others came seeking cures for ailments, as certain stones supposedly had miraculous healing powers.

- Walk a circular trail through the Bluestack Mountains, taking in the gorgeous countryside.
 - Follow a short trail to the national monument that lies within the Disert Circular Walk.
 - Discover the history of the mountains and the reasons ancient pilgrims traveled there.

Upon arriving, you will visit the John Molloy Woollen Mills, a family-run operation that produces exquisite knitwear. You will observe the artisans masterfully weaving wool and tweed goods using techniques that have been handed down through the generations. Following the demonstration, you may shop for merchandise such as Aran fisherman sweaters, scarves and Donegal tweed jackets. While snacking on scones at the Corner House, you will watch traditional Irish soda bread being made from scratch. Still, few traditions are as well-known as the Irish wake, a glorious send-off for the deceased. You will have the opportunity to take part in a re-enactment of a wake, complete with music, snuff taking and a tasting of poitin, a uniquely Irish spirit much like moonshine.

- Watch weavers make fine Irish knitwear in the traditional town of Ardara.
- Enjoy fresh-made scones while enjoying an Irish soda bread-making demonstration.

OVERVIEW

Delve into the culture and traditions of wonderfully remote Donegal County by browsing the Glencolmcille Folk Village, a replica of a rural village that presents life as it was centuries ago. A panoramic drive will showcase the county's wild remote setting, which should put you in just the right frame of mind to experience rural life dating back to the 18th century. You might meander through a thatched-roof pub, an authentic fisherman's cottage, a craft shop full of locally made merchandise and a school house with a display of poetry by Welsh author Dylan Thomas, who spent considerable time in Donegal. Other highlights include a traditional music performance, a snack of scones and tea, and a revealing talk on home remedies for ailments. Be sure to ask about Father McDyer, who created the folk village in 1967 to employ locals who were emigrating in large numbers because work was scarce.

- Enjoy a leisurely drive through a ruggedly scenic, remote area of County Donegal.

Designed in 1895 as a warehouse, it was the first public commission completed by young Charles, and is the perfect place to begin a Mackintosh tour of Glasgow. Situated in the heart of Glasgow, just off the Style Mile, it is now a visitor's center, exhibition space and events venue. You will have an approximately 30 minutes guided tour about the history of Charles Rennie Mackintosh's, as well as how his work impacted on the city he came from, followed by a refreshment break and free time to explore some more on your own. The Lighthouse has two viewing points, located in the tower, from where you'll get the best views of Glasgow; one of them being the highest point in the city. It spent two of those centuries partly in ruin, victim of severe naval bombardment during the 18th-century Jacobite rebellion. After 20 years of careful restoration, it reopened in the 1930s. Your inside tour will reveal many telling examples of the castle's battle-hardened history – from the billeting room with 12-foot thick walls to the lavish dining hall with secret tunnels behind its walls.

OVERVIEW

Settle back and enjoy wonderful coastal scenery enroute to your guided visit at an elegant castle on a hill overlooking the Moray Firth. Actually, Dunrobin looks rather more like a French chateau than the usual dark-stone Scottish castle; thank all the white stone and gleaming conical towers for that. At 189 rooms, it's the largest great house in the Northern Highlands and also one of the most ancient continuously-inhabited buildings in Britain, with sections dating back to the early 1300s. Like most medieval castles, Dunrobin started out as a fortress-like keep named after its originator, Earl Robin. After extensive home improvements made by the best architects during the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries, the splendid turreted castle you'll tour today is a absolute visual treat, inside and out. The building sits regally on its site, overlooking sprawling formal gardens that in turn overlook the sea. As grand as the interior is – including a portrait-lined main stairway that's 30 feet wide and 50 feet high, and a 10,000-volume library – the grounds are just as inspiring. Peterhead Prison is now a museum where it is easy to imagine the horrors of life behind bars. Conditions were harsh in the so-called “Hate Factory,” as the prison was known. It operated for 125 years before closing in 2013 and the stories of the convicts held there are legendary. For instance, the notorious murderer Hannibal the Cannibal was in solitary confinement for a record 39 years. You will hear every gruesome detail as you walk through the cell blocks and elsewhere. On a lighter note, you will then drive around Aberdeen admiring the key landmarks, many of them constructed with locally quarried granite, which is why Aberdeen is nicknamed Granite City. If you notice the granite sparkling, it is most likely the quartz and mica within the granite reflecting the sunlight.
