EDI-004 ST. ANDREW'S - HOME OF GOLF

OVERVIEW

Enthusiasts won't want to miss this pilgrimage to St. Andrews and the legendary links known simply as the Old Course. It's a picturesque two-hour drive from Leith into the North Sea coastal county of Fife, branching off the main road onto country byways with fine pastoral views as you head ever closer to St. Andrews. On arrival, you'll make a brief stop at the atmospheric ruins of St. Andrews Cathedral, its great east window and surviving 12th-century foundations presenting one of Scotland's most photographed scenes. Your tour continues with a panoramic drive through this bustling market town, before arriving at St. Andrews most enduring claim to fame: The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews. Founded 1754, The Club is the headquarters of world golf and holds supreme sway in all golfing matters. After your exterior view of the Club, you'll have free time for a stroll around areas of the Old Course, or to browse in one of the many small specialist shops selling golfing memorabilia and togs here. Or to simply breathe in the sea air as you ponder the drama these noble fairways and greens have seen.

- Enjoy a scenic drive across Fife's rolling hills enroute to the market town of St. Andrews.
- Stop for photos at the impressive ruins of St. Andrews Cathedral, once largest and greatest in the land.

OVERVIEW

Walk Edinburgh's glorious Royal Mile, the medieval thoroughfare that stretches from Edinburgh Castle to the Palace of Holyroodhouse. The walk will commence at the castle's esplanade in the shadow of the imposing fortress, the city's oldest building. While descending the Royal Mile, you will pass a litany of historical buildings such as Gladstone's Land, the former townhouse of a wealthy merchant that has been restored to its 17th-century splendor. You will also see Lady Stair's House, a literary museum dedicated to the works of Sir Walter Scott and Robert Louis Stevenson, both of whom were born in Edinburgh. Upon reaching the end

of the street, you will enjoy free time, during which you might explore Holyroodhouse, the British monarch's official residence in Scotland. In the 18th century, famed novelist Daniel Defoe hailed the Royal Mile as "the largest, longest and finest street in the world." It remains extraordinary even today.

OVERVIEW

Survey Edinburgh's most famous landmarks by panoramic coach and tour the castle that has crowned Castle Rock for a millennium. It's said that ancient British tribes clustered their wooden huts on this same rocky outcrop, believing the windy heights brought greater security. Today, Edinburgh Castle is still secure enough to safeguard the Scottish Crown Jewels you will see on dazzling display during your inside visit. Entering through the main gate as warriors Robert the Bruce and William Wallace gaze down on you forebodingly, you'll pass from modern times to medieval – and soon find yourself immersed in a place of profound history. Just one example is seeing the Royal bedchamber where Mary, Queen of Scots gave birth to James VI – the King who united the thrones of Scotland and England in 1603. Returning to the present day, you'll travel by coach through Old Town, descending along the ridge known as the Royal Mile. This fabled route takes you along Castle Hill, Lawnmarket, High Street and Canongate, passing lofty St. Giles Cathedral, picturesque tenement houses and their tiny side "wynds," and the Palace of Holyrood House, official Scottish residence of the Queen.

OVERVIEW

Explore parts of Edinburgh that are often overlooked but shouldn't be, as these revitalized areas have become thriving destinations. For instance, Dean Village was once a separate section of town where many mill workers lived, and it still seems vastly different from busier Edinburgh. Highlights include a 19th-century residential building for the mill workers known as Well Court and Dean Bridge, which spans the Water of Leith. You will next explore Stockbridge, a village on the north edge of Edinburgh that is wonderfully bohemian and artsy. Landmarks include the Roman temple-inspired St. Bernard's Well, whose waters supposedly have medicinal qualities, and Stockbridge Colonies, a cluster of 19th-century stone homes that is really a village within a village. Then there is Leith, a port for more than 1,000 years. You might see what was once the largest swing bridge in the United Kingdom, a 17th-century signal tower that was originally a windmill and the statue of Roberts Burns.

OVERVIEW

Experience the beauty of a drive through Orkney's southern islands, stopping at sites with wartime history and a village where the shopping is peaceful. You'll depart Kirkwall to the south, hugging the coast along Scapa Flow as you learn why action seen here during World Wars I and II make this one of the world's best-known stretches of water. Heading across the Churchill Barriers, a series of four rock causeways that link Orkney's main island to smaller south islands previously only reachable by ferry, you'll first arrive at Lamb Holm. While uninhabited, this tiny islet is home to the Italian Chapel – converted from a raw corrugated metal hut into a place of hand-painted beauty by Italian prisoners during World War II. You'll be touched by your visit here, as are the "Camp 60" ex-prisoners and their descendants who still come to visit. Further south is the island of South Ronaldsay and its pretty village of St. Margaret's Hope. Stopping here for a while, you'll learn more about the people behind that name and have some time to meander streets lined with handsome stone cottages or perhaps do a little impromptu shopping at the excellent craft workshop.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Head south hugging the coast of Scapa Flow, whose waters have famous tales to tell.
- Cross to the southern islands via the Churchill Barriers, causeways built to block enemy access to the Scapa Flow.
- Visit a beautiful Italian Chapel built on an uninhabited islet by Italian prisoners during WWII.
- Spend awhile wandering or craft shopping in the charming stone village of St. Margaret's Hope.

KOI-001 ANCIENT TREASURES OF ORKNEY

OVERVIEW

Venture into the historical heartland of Orkney to visit pre-historic landmarks and the intriguing Scapa Flow. You'll head from Kirkwall across Mainland island, passing through a gently rolling landscape and into the UNESCO-designated Heart of Neolithic Orkney – a World Heritage site recognized for its ancient archaeological wealth. The drive brings you past the Standing Stones of Stenness, four tall Neolithic slabs with sharply angled tops; if time permits, the coach will stop here for a closer view. Not far away, the Ring of Brodgar awaits – you'll spend awhile admiring this huge ceremonial circle of standing stones somehow raised in place 5,000 years ago. You'll also visit Skara Brae, a village of clustered dwellings dating to about that same era. Buried for millennia, they were only revealed from under the sand dunes by a chance storm in 1850. Nearby is Skail House, a 1620 manor built on top of an ancient Pre-Norse burial ground. Following the coast of Scapa Flow, one of the world's best-known stretches of sheltered water, you'll encounter some far more modern history; this is where the German naval fleet scuttled itself soon at World War I's end. WWII saw calamitous action here, too.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Travel into the region known as the Heart of Neolithic Orkney, a UNESCO World Heritage site.
- See 5,000-year-old landmarks including the Standing Stones of Stenness, the Ring of Brodgar, and the Neolithic village of Skara Brae.
- Drive along the coast of Scapa Flow, whose waters once sheltered Viking ships yet have more chilling modern tales to tell.

OVERVIEW

TAN-001 TORSHAVN - THE CAPITAL

OVERVIEW

Explore the historical district of Tinganes in the diminutive capital of the Faroe Islands for a revealing glimpse into Tórshavn's past. Once the home of the parliament for more than 1,000 years, Tinganes was rebuilt in the late 1600s following a devastating fire. Although the prime minister's office is still located there, most of the buildings are stone-and-timber, red-painted residences with grass-covered roofs. Tinganes exudes charm, especially along the winding streets in the center of the district. Not far away, you will find Fort Skansin, which was built in the 16th century to protect Tórshavn from pirate attacks. The older cannons there are Danish, the newer ones are from World War II. You will also visit the Nordic House, a glass-and-steel cultural center with a contemporary design—except for its turf roof. The other modern sections of Tórshavn are just as alluring and provide a perspective that belies the capital's founding in the 13th century and even longer history.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Explore the most historical district of Tórshavn, an area that the Vikings settled.
- View where the original parliament met for more than 1,000 years.
- Visit a 16th-century fort that was further fortified during World War II.
- Enjoy the contrast of contemporary Tórshavn set against its turf-roofed Old Town.

Once back on dry land, it's time for lunch and an interval spent soaking up the fascinating info on display at Husavik Whale Museum. Enroute back to Akureyri, you'll stop to take in the roar of Godafoss, its waters plunging over a huge horseshoe-shaped rim to form one of Iceland's most impressive natural wonders. But then, nothing quite compares to the sight of a giant Blue Whale or leaping Humpback.

Once you've seen how the humans live here, you'll take a leisurely guided island walk to see how Vigur's resident birds thrive in their own natural habitats. As your visit draws to a close, refreshments will be served by the farmer's family before the boat ride back to Isafjordur.

Many of their structures still stand, little changed from how they were then. And since the village has been an ecologically protected area for decades, the native flora and fauna have had a field day. Hikers here often encounter Arctic foxes, seals, and birds of many types. You'll stroll around the eerily empty village with your guide, enjoying traditional Icelandic refreshments at a house where the doctor used to live. Don't miss this chance for what will certainly be an excursion unlike any other you take this voyage.

Saddle up and get your sense of wonder going full gallop on a scenic ride through the countryside outside Reykjavik on an Icelandic horse. On arrival at the riding center in Hafnarfjörður, you'll be geared up with overalls, riding helmet, boots and gloves – and introduced to your extremely sure-footed, keen and friendly Icelandic mount. Adorned with long, shaggy manes and thick coats, these purebred descendants of ancient Viking steeds and renowned for their good ride and gentle, calm disposition. Which is handy, because much of the terrain you'll be seeing is wild. It might be the lava fields surrounding Mt. Helgafell Volcano and the Kaldársel area, or remote and primal Lake Hvaleyjarvatn, with the beautiful Blá fjöll Mountains as your companion on the horizon. Icelandic horses also have one other unique trick about them, one well suited to the country's rugged glacial landscape. Beyond the usual walk, trot and gallop, they know another unique gait: the tölt. It's a flowing four-beat gait where the rider stretches down in the stirrup, then sits back into the sensation of floating. The secure high steps involved let your Icelandic horse move easily over terrain that might stop other breeds in their tracks.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Head out by coach from Reykjavik pier to the Ishestar Riding Centre in Hafnarfjörður south of town.
- Get geared up and introduced to the shaggy, compact Icelandic horse – famed for its great riding qualities.

Speaking of which, the flavor of that lobster lunch at a coastal restaurant will feel like a prayer, answered.

The museum’s ice cave and glacier displays are particularly insightful, as they show what would happen if Iceland’s ancient glaciers melted due to climate change.

Cruise into the beautiful Nuup Kangerlua fjord to look for humpback whales, which usually frequent these waters to feed and often breach the surface in acrobatic displays. As you approach uninhabited Sermitsiaq Island in the fjord, you will see a saddle-shaped mountain rising from the island's heart. When the weather warms and the snow and glaciers melt, a waterfall usually thunders off the mountain and into the crystal-clear waters of the fjord below. It is quite the sight, as is the wildlife that typically frequents this area. There is no telling what will appear, but you can expect to see frolicking seals, soaring eagles and perhaps humpback whales. If they are present, the whales will no doubt steal the show, especially if one leaps from the water and lands with a tremendous splash. Scientists think whales breach the water to clean pests from their skin. However, they may do it just for fun.
