





OVERVIEW

OVERVIEW

Travel deep into the Scottish heartland, and the country's history, to visit a great Gothic palace where kings have been crowned since time immemorial. Be ready for a startling contrast when you cross over by bridge to stately Prince Street, lined with handsome gardens on one side and "modern" Georgian architecture on the other. Holyrood's royal parklands remain the city's foremost green oasis, with serene ponds and plentiful waterfowl. A stop at the park's highest point, Arthur's Seat, provides a fabulous photo opp, with views that overlook all of Edinburgh and far beyond.







While following a guide through the multi-turreted castle – which the queen eventually gifted to a trust – be sure to notice its z-plan design, which features a central rectangular tower house and two wings at the diagonally opposite corners. Another feature well worth a look are the gun slits throughout the ground floor. Although parts of the castle such as the rounded arch entrance are original, much of the castle has been renovated. The gardens were also revitalized with hedging and new paths that created greater focal points. As you will see, the grounds are spectacular. You will also stop for photos at two nearby attractions: the early 1600s church Canisbay Kirk and Castle Town, a village much of which was constructed with locally quarried stone.

Hike the staggeringly beautiful trails of Knockan Crag, a set of ancient cliffs that taught 19th-century geologists the secret of what happens when continents collide. A walk across these exposed layered rock formations in the Highlands north of Ullapool lets you see 500 million years of geological history in a single glance – even touch it with your own hands. After an enlightening orientation of the crag's geology in the Rock Room interpretive center, you'll venture out along the trails. The hike will bring you past the famed Moine Thrust, where the darker rocks on top were discovered to be much older than the lighter-colored ones beneath them. The explanation of this phenomenon set the 19th-century scientific world afire - since it provided rock-hard evidence for the first time that the earth's crust can shift sideways in response to enormous collision forces within its underlying tectonic plates. Well-understood now, the idea that these thrust tectonics could be responsible for building mountains - including the Alps and Himalayas – was utterly revolutionary at the time. Your present-day trek involves quite a bit of single-file walking, at times over steep rocky terrain, but the amazing views are well worth it.







As you stroll its tree-lined

Luckily, the Mackenzie family continued to seed this garden for generations, then ceded it to the National Trust for all to enjoy.








Vast and open to the sea, the cave provides an ideal shelter for nesting cormorants and other seabird species. It's sure to be a scenic and fun adventure.



By the way, the Isle of Man's 1000-year-old High Court of Tynwald is the longest-running continuous parliament on the planet.

Remarkably, their system is still in place, making Tynwald the oldest nonstop governing assembly on the planet. Legend has it that this eminent hill contains earth gathered from all seventeen of the isle's parishes.

The house's gardens are a magnificent treat of their own; landscaped in 1891, they feature topiary pyramids and an extensive collection of Magnolias, roses and seasonal plants. Wander at will before returning to your ship in time for lunch.

Restored and reimagined after a damaging storm in 1990, the garden is a mix of formal and informal plantings with walled garden walks, spectacular woodland valley views and world-famous Camellia, Magnolia, Rhododendron and Hydrangea collections. Tour them at your leisure.



Once you've added the Giant to your own image library, Minterne House and its spectacular horseshoe-shaped gardens are next on the agenda. This extremely impressive estate has been in the same hands for hundreds of years and was landscaped in the Capability Brown style so fashionable during the 1700s. The garden's stellar collection of Himalayan rhododendrons and azaleas are set amongst fine and rare trees, accented by a chain of small lakes, waterfalls and streams with water gardens. Flowering cherries brought from Japan in 1920 and large Magnolia campbelli trees flower showily in the spring together with a profusion of bulbs. Nearly two miles of walks rich with understory plantings and framed by mature cedars and beeches provide new vistas at every turn, and the changing seasons make Minterne memorable at any time of year.


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
- · Savor a panoramic drive that winds through beautifully pastoral Dorset
