### GRU-001 MYSTICAL CHARM OF SNAEFELLSNES

#### OVERVIEW

Spend a day steeped in the magical atmosphere of western Iceland's most dramatic landscapes, many of them mysterious and sacred. The circular expedition begins with an immensely picturesque coastal drive, passing through one beautiful fishing village after another enroute to Snæfellsjökull National Park. This 65-square-mile wonderland is where the adventurers in Jules Verne's 1864 Journey to the Center of the Earth found a passage to the earth's core, and it looks every bit the part. You'll walk along pebbled Djúpálónssandur Beach, admiring strange rock formations along the shore – where sailors once proved their fitness to crew on ships by hoisting the heavy boulders. Passing the Lóndrangar Cliffs, you'll stop for photos and lunch in tiny Arnarstapi, known for its abundant birdlife and curious lava formations. In remote Búðir, you'll encounter a modest church of black painted wood, sitting in a lava field blanketed with lush grass. The visual contrast is stunning, especially with the park's namesake glacier-capped volcano as its backdrop. Then it's on to Helgafell – the famous "Holy Mountain" of Icelandic literature and history; you'll learn about its magic powers. Some free time in charming and eco-friendly Stykkisholmur at the tip of the peninsula marks the outing's end.

#### HIGHLIGHTS

- Travel in a majestic loop through atmospheric West Iceland by panoramic coach.
- Stop frequently to take in many geologically and culturally unique sights throughout the day.

#### OVERVIEW

Discover the must-see attractions of the Snæfellsjökull Peninsula, a geological and natural wonderland famed for its harsh but beautiful volcanic landscape. You'll begin with an immensely picturesque coastal drive, passing through one beautiful fishing village after another enroute to Snæfellsjökull National Park. This terrain in the setting Jules Verne's used in his 1864 bestseller, Journey to the Center of the Earth – it looks the part.

The park's landscape looks primeval in every direction, especially at Djúpálónssandur, a jagged coastline strewn with large boulders sailors once hoisted to prove their fitness to crew on ships. The remains of a sizable trawler wrecked in 1948 add to the edge-of-the-earth feel here. A visit to Malarri and its majestic white lighthouse also brings an encounter with curious volcanic pillars some believe local elves use as churches. Passing the Lóndrangar Cliffs, you'll stop for photos in tiny Arnarstapi, known for abundant birdlife and its own set of intriguing lava formations. In remote Búðir, you'll visit a modest church of black painted wood, sitting in a lava field blanketed with lush grass. The visual contrast is stunning, especially with the park's namesake glacier-capped volcano as its backdrop. Better clear plenty of storage on your camera.

#### HIGHLIGHTS

- Enjoy a picture-perfect exploration of the Snæfellsjökull Peninsula by panoramic coach.
- Stop frequently to visit some of the highlights of this harsh but beautiful volcanic wonderland.

#### OVERVIEW

Explore Iceland's legend-laced volcanic landscape on a walk-through lava field, a climb up a small magic mountain, and a visit to a farm with an unusual crop. First, you'll travel by coach along the incredibly picturesque coast to Berserkjahraun, an ancient field of lava spikes and mossy boulders. If its name sounds familiar, that's because the phrase "going berserk" comes from an old Icelandic tale about two warriors who were killed here; these Berserkers were known to fight in an uncontrollable trance-like state. Then it's on to Helgafell; where legend has it that those who scale this 240-foot "Holy Mountain" are granted three wishes. You'll have your chance to confirm if that's true – and be rewarded with sweeping hilltop vistas no matter what. In Stykkisholmur, you'll you will have some free time. A different sort of museum awaits you on a lava-surrounded farmstead in Bjarnarhofn. Here you'll visit the Shark Museum and meet the resident farmer who specializes in shark curing. You'll also have a chance to taste his products, but a word to the wise: they're quite 'aromatic.' Might be wise to bring some mints for the way home.

GRU-005 A JOURNEY TO THE CENTER OF THE EARTH

OVERVIEW

Embark on an adventurous exploration deep into the lava caves of Vatnshellir, formed thousands of years ago by a violent eruption. Western Iceland is the setting Jules Verne used for his epic 1864 page-turner, Journey to the Center of the Earth, wherein the professor and his intrepid crew get into all kinds of adventures after entering a passage into the earth on Snæfellsjökul Peninsula. Your expedition down into Vatnshellir will be much the same, but with better ventilation – and no dinosaurs. The lava tube entrance is a scenic hour’s drive from the pier, along a rugged coast and majestic volcanic landscape. Equipped with helmet and flashlight, you’ll follow your guide through an above-ground entry capsule and down into the cave’s upper section, lined with fascinating lava formations along its sides. A long, narrow passage and spiral staircase lead ever deeper until you reach the cave’s lower section, a completely soundless chamber with black igneous walls. Once there, all lights will briefly be turned off so that you can experience true total darkness. Expect your sense of smell to become heightened as your brain lets go of sight and sound. Then it’s back up to the surface, with new perspective.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Settle in for a drive across the one-of-a-kind Snæfellsjökull Peninsula landscape by panoramic coach.
- Don your helmet and check your flashlight, both supplied, as you prepare to enter Vatnshellir lava cave.
- Follow your guide inside and down through lava tubes and stairways leading to a soundless base chamber nearly 11 stories underground.
- Experience the rare sensation of total darkness and silence as we all briefly turn out our lights.
- Learn about what forces went into making this place happen, and what folklore has grown up around it.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Wear warm, layered clothing.
- Flat, sturdy walking shoes are recommended; no heels, please.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

PLEASE NOTE

This tour includes approximately an hour of moderate-to-strenuous walking that covers ½ mile and includes a long, narrow and circular staircase as well as uneven, rocky and gravel surfaces with steep inclines. OVERVIEW

Take an invigorating walk-in exhilarating scenery as you venture through Grundarfjörður to an idyllic waterfall at the base of Iceland’s most photographed mountain. Setting out on foot from the pier, you’ll cross through this picture-perfect fishing village perched on a fjord and surrounded by mountains. Soon you’ll ascend a small hill above the town and, weather permitting, be treated to one of the Snæfellsnes peninsula most breathtaking vistas: the iconic Mt. Kirkjufell. This distinctive monolith rises steeply from shore to a height of over 1,500 feet – a barren but magnificent landmark that only the adventurous climb. Conveniently, you’ll be taking on an easy and super-scenic alternative as you trek to the gorgeous waterfall near Kirkjufell’s base, its multiple torrents of crystalline water fed by glacier melt. Any photograph taken with this cascade in the foreground and Kirkjufell soaring to the heavens behind can’t help but be a winner. In fact, photographers, and filmmakers from all over the world come to Grundarfjörður just to capture this image. On the return walk, you’ll want to check out the fishing boats in the charming harbor, the church, and the homes built by the town’s French founders.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Explore the picture-perfect fishing village of Grundarfjörður on foot and catch the perfect picture of its surrounding landscape.
- Ascend a hill overlooking town for spectacular vantage point on the Snæfellsnes peninsula scenery.
- Trek to the spot where idyllic Kirkjufellsfoss waterfall cascades in multiple streams with iconic Mt. Kirkjufell as its backdrop.
- Photograph this scene of incomparable natural majesty, as so many famous photographers have.

GRU-007 PUFFINS OF MELRAKKAÆY ISLAND

OVERVIEW

Cruise to rocky Melrakkaey Island to for up-close views of a colony of puffins doing all the things that puffins naturally do. This includes nesting on the steep cliffs, swimming in the sea and perhaps even flying – much faster than you might expect. After a short walk from the pier, you’ll reach and board a small tour boat that is ideal for sightseeing in hard-to-reach places. Craggy little Melrakkaey Island is one of those enviable spots, a protected bird refuge since 1972 where the only crowds ever seen have wings. While you’ll likely spot other seabirds here – like guillemots, shags and kittiwakes – puffins are the star attractions. They’re easy to identify with their bright orange beaks and penguin-like coloring; some people even call them “sea parrots” because of the shape of their beaks. Iceland is the breeding ground for most the world’s Atlantic puffins, and Melrakkaey is one of their favorite spots. You’ll see their nests on the precipitous rocky cliffs and surely spot puffins resting on the water between dives for the

tasty small herring they love to eat. Your guide will share fascinating facts about the lifestyle of these charming birds during the excursion.

OVERVIEW

Discover the natural wonders in western Iceland, especially around Snæfellsjökull National Park, an area that has been famous since 1864, when Jules Verne used it as a setting in his classic science fiction novel "Journey to the Center of the Earth." The landscape looks eerily primeval, especially at Djupalónssandur, whose coastline is strewn with large rocks and the remains of a shipwrecked fishing trawler. Sailors once demonstrated their strength there by lifting boulders to show that they were fit to work on ships. While walking along the beach at Arnarstapi, you will observe birds nesting in the craggy lava formations. A noticeably different volcanic terrain awaits you in Búðir, whose beach features yellowish sand instead the pitch-black sand commonly found elsewhere. The modest Búðir church is also noteworthy. Painted black, it sits in a lava field blanketed with lush grass, and the contrast is stunning. An ice-capped volcano looms dramatically in the background.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Enjoy a panoramic drive through western Iceland's hauntingly beautiful volcanic terrain.
- Behold a primeval landscape of volcanoes, lava fields and rock-strewn beaches.
- Look for wildlife, birds in particular, that often nest on the coastal cliffs.
- Pause at Búðir church, a 19th-century wooden building that overlooks the sea.

make this sometimes harsh landscape their home. Starting off from the pier, you will first drive through the center of Isafjordur along the Oshlid Road, before heading towards Bolungarvik. Just outside of Bolungarvik, a stop will be made at the outdoor exhibit of Osvor, an old fisherman's hut that was restored in 1988. The hut is a perfect example of how life was for the local fishermen in the beginning of the 20th century. Following your visit, you will continue on to Bolungarvik for a tour through the village. Leaving Bolungarvik behind, your coach will head back to Isafjordur, taking a breathtaking scenic route that provides picturesque views of the magnificent mountains of the Djup, the largest fjord in West Fjords and the Buna River. A stop will be made at the waterfall in Tunguskogur, where you will have the opportunity to taste the fresh, clear mountain water that flows down the stream. Arriving back in Isafjordur, a panoramic drive through the old streets brings you to the Maritime and Folk Museum. Situated in one of the oldest and most well-preserved houses in Isafjordur, the Museum has an excellent collection of items related mainly to the area's maritime history as well as a large accordion collection. At the conclusion of your museum visit, you will re-join your coach for the short transfer back to the pier.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Explore the remote Westfjords region by coach, stopping to absorb the local color in its many forms.
- Visit the remote fishing village of Bolungarvik and tour a century-old fisherman's hut nearby in Ósvör.

Take an unhurried stroll through Akureyri, set majestically between fjord and mountain near the Arctic Circle. Discover its colorful cultural life and learn about its 16th-century origins as a remote Danish trading post. Foremost among the landmarks you'll encounter is a hilltop Lutheran church whose modern design has become a symbol of the city (outside visit). It was spirited here for safekeeping after Coventry Cathedral was bombed by air raids during World War II, and never went back. Then we weave our way uphill to one of the northernmost botanic gardens in the world. There you can find a surprising number of alien taxa, beside Icelandic native species. The charming coffeehouse in the garden is a popular meeting place for both locals and foreign visitors. On the way back to the center, we will pass Akureyri Junior College which is among the oldest and best-known educational establishments in Iceland. At your guided walk's end, you'll be in midtown and free to either head back to the pier or – better yet – spend awhile exploring the cool design shops and Icelandic eateries along pedestrian-friendly Hafnarstæti street, just near the harbor.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Savor fabulous views of Iceland's longest fjord as you walk the waterfront Strandgata.
- Climb the hill to a signature church, outside visit only.
- Visit one of the northernmost botanic gardens in the world.
- After the escorted walk, reward yourself with some free-range shopping or dining on local fare.

Still, whales are the star attractions. Species such as humpback, blue and minke whales frequent these waters to gorge on the abundant plankton and fish larvae carried in the coastal currents. You may also spot white-beaked dolphins and harbor porpoises. It is a breathtaking sight to see humpback whales acrobatically breaching the water's surface, waving their flukes up and down as they dive, and feeding to fatten up for their winter migration south. If blue whales surface to exhale, the spray from their blowholes will shoot about 30 feet into the air, so it will be quite the spectacle.

You will see just how secluded this part of Iceland can be while pausing at Njarðvíkurskriður. A cliffside cross there marks the spot where, according to legend, a monster that attacked travelers fell into the sea. You will hear more folkloric tales in the teeny village of Bakkagerði and at the rocky hill Álfaborg, where locals claim the queen of Icelandic elves’ lives. One of the country’s foremost 20th-century artists painted the altarpiece at a nearby church. Still, few sights compare to Hafnarhólmí, a birdwatcher’s paradise. The observation platform will afford you an excellent view of nesting puffins, fulmars and kittiwakes; the latter being loud gulls named for their nasal “ki-ti-waak” callnotes.

You will pass the former home of beloved folk artist Ásgeir Emilsson on the way to the Skaftfell Center for Visual Art, where you will see a collection of modern multi-media works.

You will view the spot where he miraculously emerged from the water. Turning inland, you will soon reach Eldfell, the volcano that erupted in 1973 and left much of Vestmannaeyjar covered in lava and ash. The volcanic fissure was unknown until it suddenly erupted, so the town was completely unprepared for the cataclysmic event. Driving the ATV through Eldfell's crater and the surrounding volcanic landscape will reveal the magnitude of the eruption.
