LYS-001 CITY & PARK BIKE TOUR

OVERVIEW

Hop on a bicycle for an exhilarating spin through picturesque Lysekil, from its beautifully preserved Old Town to a coastline where nature is well-preserved, too. Established as a fishing village in the 1560s, Lysekil has long been tied to the sea – right down to the two fish that adorn its coat of arms. So it's fitting that your active adventure begins at the pier as you head out along the waterfront. You'll two-wheel into a magnificent stretch of pristine shoreline at Stangehuvud Nature Reserve, where the terrain hasn't changed for eons. Hopping off the bike for a time, you'll take a guided cliff walk across huge granite boulders with smooth surfaces holding small pools in their depressions. A stop for coffee and a light snack provides an energy boost and a chance to hear a bit of Lysekil history and see where Swedish stonemasons once quarried rock along this ancient coastline. Returning to the saddle, you'll pedal back to Lysekil to explore the 200-year-old Old Town – all narrow alleyways, colorful wooden houses, and flat terrain for easy riding. No question: this is a wonderful town to explore, and a bicycle is an ideal mode of transport around it.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Tour Lysekil and its surrounds on a bike for a more intimate experience than is possible by coach.
- Cycle along the coast and into an unspoiled nature preserve, with a brief cliff walk along smooth boulders.
- Enjoy a mid-trip break for coffee and a light snack along with a backgrounder on local history.
- Pedal back into town for a two-wheeled survey of Old Town's narrow lanes and colorful houses.

OVERVIEW

Sightsee along the dramatic coastline of the Bohuslän archipelago as you travel by small boat to the stylishly rustic fishing village of Smögen. During your skirt along the coasts of these craggily beautiful islets you'll likely see sailboats and kayakers carving their way through the sparkling water, seals basking in the sun, and remote fishing villages nestled within natural coves. OVERVIEW

OSL-008 HADELAND GLASS WORKS

OVERVIEW

Enjoy a scenic fjord-side drive across rural Norway to visit a venue where fine glass and crystal objects have been produced by hand since 1762. The coach journey to the town of Jevnaker skirts the shoreline of a lake dotted with tiny islands and is itself a thing of beauty. But the day's most impressive beauty will be revealed during your Hadeland tour, when you'll have the opportunity to watch expert glassblowers demonstrate their skill at transforming glowing, molten glass into beautiful shapes. They've had plenty of practice: this "factory" is the oldest industrial company still operating in Norway. A glass museum here showcases carefully selected pieces that represent the best of Hadeland's designs from over the last 250 years, and other exhibits trace the evolution of Norwegian glassmaking from its earliest days. You'll learn about how glass is made, formed and finished – and gain insights on this common but essential material's deep connections to the culture. Altogether, you'll spend about 90 minutes at the glassworks "village," a picturesque complex on the banks of yet another lovely lake, then head back to Oslo and your waiting ship.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Settle back in a comfortable coach seat for a 90-minute spin along a fjord and into rural Norway.
- Tour the oldest industrial company in Norway, a glassmaking "factory" that's been perfecting its craft since 1762.
- Watch skilled glassblowers transform blobs of molten glass into graceful finished pieces.

- Browse the extensive collection at Hadeland's in-house museum of glass history and artistry.

OVERVIEW

A panoramic drive around the inner center of Oslo takes you past the Akershus Fortress which dates back to the 13th century, the famous Oslo Opera House and the brand-new Munch Museum, currently under construction. You get a glimpse of the so-called Barcode-area, the latest addition of office buildings, as well as the new library and many apartment houses in the area of Bjørvika. Passing through the inner-city tunnel you will further on see the Royal Palace, built in the first half of the last century and the residence of the Royal Family. Arriving at the Vigeland Sculpture Park, you can see many of the 200 sculptures that are arranged over the Park's 80 acres, all created by Gustav Vigeland. Making the sculptures even more interesting is that the artist never explained his works, leaving the interpretation to each beholder. Leaving Vigeland you will drive to the Holmenkollen Ski Jump for great views of Oslo. After a photo stop, you return through residential areas back to town where a short walk takes you to the City Hall. Enjoy a guided tour of this iconic building, well-known for the Nobel peace-price ceremony every year in December.

- Be introduced to many of Oslo's signature sights on a panoramic highlights drive.
- See the city's busiest boulevards, oldest fortress, grandest palace, tallest building and more.

OVERVIEW

It's a slightly downhill trek of just over four miles, beginning up in the Nydalen neighborhood along walking paths that trace this historic river as it runs from Lake Maridalsvannet, pristine source of the city's drinking water, to the Oslofjord. Rambling at a very comfortable pace, you're bound to spot other walkers, bicyclists and anglers; the river is quite popular among Oslo's locals. Many of them live, work and play along the Akerselva – in loft-style apartments, modern offices and trendy shops that occupy converted industrial buildings that once hummed with activity along these banks in the 19th and 20th century. During the walk, you'll pass several historical textile mills, spillways and statues honoring those who labored at these former factories. Breathe in the fresh, clean air and drink in the wonderful scenery as you meander through leafy woodlands and green spaces that happen to pass through the very center of Oslo. By the walk's end, you'll be right back where you began – at the cruise pier.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Walk with your guide to a "T-bane" metro station for the ride up to Nydalen in Oslo's northern outskirts.
- Pick up a riverside trail that winds gently downhill, tracing the picturesque banks of the Akerselva.

From Bygdøy you will drive along the harbor with its many pleasure boats and have a glimpse of the charming Oscarshall Castle, the summer residence of the Swedish/Norwegian King Oscar I.

A local artist created them in honor of the 34 species of native birds that nest in the area. The Tank is another unexpected cultural venue. This old fish oil tank is now used for art exhibitions and concerts.

There is no way to predict what marine life you will see, but humpbacks, blue fin, minke and sei whales are often spotted in the

fjord. Occasionally, a blue whale – the world's largest animal – will surface to exhale. It will be quite the spectacle as the spray from their blowholes shoots about 30 feet into the air.

The journey is both scenic and swift; just about half an hour to traverse the Ísafjarðardjúp fjord to Vigur, where a cluster of red-roofed buildings sits tranquilly against a dramatic snow-capped backdrop. This sparsely populated islet is home to thousands of feathered citizens – comical puffins, eider ducks, guillemots and sometimes-overprotective arctic terns who love to swoop. Upon arrival, you'll have a chance to observe local life on the island, where the farmers make a living by harvesting the down of eider ducks – and provide essential protection for their nests and chicks. It's hard not to feel like you've stepped back in time as you meet with the tiny band of welcoming inhabitants. Their relaxed, easy manner and unique lifestyle will certainly make an impression. Once you've seen how the humans live here, you'll take a leisurely guided island walk to see how Vigur's resident birds thrive in their own natural habitats. As your visit draws to a close, refreshments will be served by the farmer's family before the boat ride back to Ísafjörður.

## HIGHLIGHTS

- Skim by boat across magnificent Ísafjarðardjúp fjord to an island where the birds outnumber the humans.
- Be greeted by a family whose farm crop is eider down, collected from the nests of resident ducks they help keep protected from more aggressive birds.

- Enjoy relaxed refreshments and conversation, offered up the farmer and his family.

Once there, all lights will briefly be turned off so that you can experience true total darkness. Expect your sense of smell to become heightened as your brain lets go of sight and sound. Then it’s back up to the surface, with new perspective.

- Don your helmet and check your flashlight, both supplied, as you prepare to enter Vatnshellir lava cave.

This includes nesting on the steep cliffs, swimming in the sea and perhaps even flying – much faster than you might expect. After a short walk from the pier, you’ll reach and board a small tour boat that is ideal for sightseeing in hard-to-reach places. Craggy little Melrakkaey Island is one of those enviable spots, a protected bird refuge since 1972 where the only crowds ever seen have wings. While you’ll likely spot other seabirds here – like guillemots, shags and kittiwakes – puffins are the star attractions. They’re easy to identify with their bright orange beaks and penguin-like coloring; some people even call them “sea parrots” because of the shape of their beaks. Iceland is the breeding ground for most the world’s Atlantic puffins, and Melrakkaey is one of their favorite spots. You’ll see their nests on the precipitous rocky cliffs and surely spot puffins resting on the water between dives for the

tasty small herring they love to eat. Your guide will share fascinating facts about the lifestyle of these charming birds during the excursion.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Walk to a tour boat near the cruise pier, ideally sized for reaching areas off limits to larger vessels.
- Cruise out to Melrakkaey, an island offshore from Grundarfjörður that’s now a protected seabird refuge.
- Watch the resident colony of colorful puffins at their nests, diving for fish, and even flying around.
- Learn about the lifestyle and mating habits of these charming half-parrot, half-penguin creatures.
- Look for plenty of other sea birds here as well, including guillemots, shags and kittiwakes.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Wear warm, layered clothing; consider a windbreaker.
- Flat walking shoes with a non-slip sole are recommended for the boat.
- Bring a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen as needed.

You’ll also have a chance to taste his products, but a word to the wise: they’re quite ‘aromatic.’ Might be wise to bring some mints for the way home.

- Visit the legendary lava field where the term “going berserk” comes from.
- Scale a small mountain, actually more of a flat top hill, that is said to richly reward those who climb it.

The visual contrast is stunning, especially with the park's namesake glacier-capped volcano as its backdrop. Better clear plenty of storage on your camera.

- Enjoy a picture-perfect exploration of the Snæfellsjökull Peninsula by panoramic coach.
- Stop frequently to visit some of the highlights of this harsh but beautiful volcanic wonderland.
