YHZ-023 TUNNELS, TALES AND MYSTERIES OF GEORGES ISLAND

OVERVIEW
Enjoy a short but scenic ferry ride to Georges Island for an enlightening tour of this National Historic Site in the middle of Halifax Harbour. The indigenous Mi'kmaq people were the first inhabitants of the area, which they called Kijipuktuk, meaning "the great harbour." Guides onsite, dressed in a period military uniform, describe how French trappers arrived in the 17th century, followed by the British who built Fort Charlotte there. As you will discover, the fort played a strategic role in the War of 1812 and through the end of the 19th century, when its weapons became obsolete. As you walk through the brick-lined tunnels that were built beneath the fort, you will see how ammunition was stored in the underground bomb-proof shelters and hear tales of the soldiers that manned Fort Charlotte. The fort was upgraded with Bofors 40mm anti-aircraft guns in World War II, the last time it was used for military purposes.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Ride the ferry through Halifax Harbour to and from Georges Island.
- Enjoy an enlightening tour of Fort Charlotte, which protected Halifax for two centuries.
- Hear tales of the fort's military history while walking through the tunnels beneath the fort.

You will also drop by the Halifax waterfront, where you can browse local shops, discover unique artisanal goods, and enjoy the vibrant atmosphere of this historic harbor area.

Phantom bell ringers supposedly haunt the church, a story that it has been commemorated on stamps. Before returning to the pier, you will also see St. Peter’s Anglican Cathedral, which was constructed in 1869. Designed by one of Prince Edward Island’s leading architects at the time, the church is inspiring, as is the attached All Souls Chapel, a National Historic Site.

Since summer 2002, following major renovations, La Pulperie de Chicoutimi opens its doors to the public and offers artistic and ethnologic displays on the history of the locals' inhabitants. Finally, you'll visit Le Chevrier du Nord, a farm that raises angora goats for mohair clothing. It's quite the enterprise and a memorable end to your tour before driving back to the pier.

The interior is stunning, especially the exquisite gold-leaf woodwork and glorious high altar. Perched on the slopes of Mount Royale, it draws pilgrims worldwide that come to pray for healing. The city's natural beauty is best expressed at Mount Royal Park, parts of which were originally landscaped by Frederick Law Olmsted, who designed New York's Central Park. Being the highest point in the city, the park affords wonderful views of Montreal's skyline, the St. Lawrence River and the surrounding countryside. For yet another perspective of Montreal, you will drive through Golden Square Mile, where the wealthiest families built Victorian and Renaissance homes more than a century ago.

OVERVIEW

Montreal also has its share of noteworthy modern buildings such as the Palais des Congrès convention center and the dazzling World Trade Center, which occupies a full city block. The latter is an architectural triumph of historical buildings linked by a glassed-covered promenade.
