OVERVIEW

Walk Edinburgh's glorious Royal Mile, the medieval thoroughfare that stretches from Edinburgh Castle to the Palace of Holyroodhouse. OVERVIEW

Enjoy a relaxing narrated spin through Edinburgh, capturing the capital's ancient essence through its most iconic landmarks. Holyrood's royal parklands remain the city's foremost green oasis, with serene ponds and plentiful waterfowl. A

stop at the park's highest point, Arthur's Seat, provides a fabulous photo opp, with views that overlook all of Edinburgh and far beyond.

Today, Edinburgh Castle is still secure enough to safeguard the Scottish Crown Jewels you will see on dazzling display during your inside visit. Entering through the main gate as warriors Robert the Bruce and William Wallace gaze down on you forebodingly, you'll pass from modern times to medieval – and soon find yourself immersed in a place of profound history. Just one example is seeing the Royal bedchamber where Mary, Queen of Scots gave birth to James VI – the King who united the thrones of Scotland and England in 1603. Returning to the present day, you'll travel by coach

through Old Town, descending along the ridge known as the Royal Mile. This fabled route takes you along Castle Hill, Lawnmarket, High Street and Canongate, passing lofty St. Giles Cathedral, picturesque tenement houses and their tiny side “wynds,” and the Palace of Holyrood House, official Scottish residence of the Queen.

Your present-day trek involves quite a bit of single-file walking, at times over steep rocky terrain, but the amazing views are well worth it.

Luckily, the Mackenzie family continued to seed this garden for generations, then ceded it to the National Trust for all to enjoy.

Visitors will explore exhibits, historical artifacts, and personal accounts that highlight the resilience of the Derry community in the face of division. Next you will travel to a local venue where you will be treated to an Irish coffee while listening to traditional music. Afterwards, you will return to the pier.

You'll be touring this period mini-city where dozens of historical homes stand and recreated period businesses like apothecaries and pubs show how businesses were run and what merchandise was available in Ireland back then. You can board a full-scale replica sailing ship to get a sense of the incredibly cramped conditions passengers endured on their long crossing to America, right down to the sound of creaking timbers. For a vivid picture of the life these Irish emigres were leaving behind, visit a one-room cabin shared by a poor tenant farm family of 12 or tour the grand 18th-century childhood home of someone who became one of Philadelphia's most prominent merchants. Another section of the venue recreates typical businesses the arriving Irish would frequented when they landed in America, and the types of houses that they might have lived in there.

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in the distance across the water. So, in 1837 they moved into Penrhyn, their freshly built Norman-style castle that looks like something straight out of the Elizabethan era. Arrayed on 100 acres of prime coastal parkland, it’s the object of your tour today – and there’s quite a lot to see inside. Now owned by National Trust, the interiors retain the lived-in look of a 19th-century residential castle. The style is richly gothic with a distinctly Moorish flavor, and the home’s substantial collection of old masters and family portraits is considered the finest in Wales outside Cardiff’s National Museum. A recently restored Victorian kitchen and domestic rooms add further interest to your visit. The grounds are also an impressive example of classic estate living; discover their formal gardens, semi-wooded walks and a Victorian walled garden at your leisure following your guided tour of Penrhyn’s interior.

And have a short while to stroll the town with the world’s longest name: it’s 58 letters and unpronounceable to all but the most purebred Welsh, but usually shortened to just “Llanfairpwll” or “Llanfair PG” for convenience.

While pausing at St. Brynach's Church, you will hear about its restoration in the 19th century after being left in ruins. The church's inscription stones indicate that the site is early medieval.

As you approach the main house, be sure to notice the statue of a stag with a crucifix between its antlers—the family symbol—atop the old castle.
