You'll also visit Skara Brae, a village of clustered dwellings dating to about that same era. Buried for millennia, they were only revealed from under the sand dunes by a chance storm in 1850. Nearby is Skail House, a 1620 manor built on top of an ancient Pre-Norse burial ground. Following the coast of Scapa Flow, one of the world's best-known stretches of sheltered water, you'll encounter some far more modern history; this is where the German naval fleet scuttled itself soon at World War I's end. WWII saw calamitous action here, too.

A short walk along the cruise pier leads to the ferry for your voyage up the River Dart, a bucolic waterway surrounded by steeply wooded hillsides. Along the way, you’ll see landmarks like the Britannia Royal Naval College, charming villages Stoke Gabriel and Dittisham, and Greenway Estate, once the home of mystery writer Agatha Christie. In time, you’ll disembark at Totnes, one of England’s oldest towns. Here you can opt to explore independently or follow the guide on an overview walk that includes a classic Norman castle, a collection of Tudor buildings and a sheltered “butterwalk” from Elizabethan times, where dairy goods were kept cool in the shade. You may encounter the stone marking where the Brutus of Troy stood when founding Totnes in 1200 B.C. Today, the local color and character is still attracting visitors from around the globe. Totnes has been hailed as freethinking, eco-conscious and the Capital of New Age Chic – with shops carrying healing crystals and environmentally aware clothing, and plentiful vegan restaurants.

OVERVIEW

Cruise up the River Dart to Greenway Estate for an intimate look into the life of mystery writer Agatha Christie, who made this her holiday home for nearly 40 years. The ferry departs from just a short walk away along the cruise pier, and the picturesque journey up the River Dart will carry you past a bucolic landscape of wooded hillsides plunging to the water's edge. In time you'll arrive at Greenway Estate, an elegant 18th-century Georgian house on a rise overlooking the river. Having grown up nearby, Christie had long admired this property and finally purchased it in 1938. She and her archaeologist husband then shared time here for the next four decades. As you tour the interior, you'll see memorabilia from Christie's childhood, objects from her husband's digs – even the Steinway piano that Christie played at a concert level. Meandering the grounds, her fans may recognize settings that appeared in her novels, like the footpath from Five Little Pigs and the boathouse from Dead Man's Folly. Before the ferry ride back, take some time to browse the shop and further enhance your understanding of Christie and her fulfilling life at Greenway.
