OVERVIEW

St. Nicholas Cathedral also can't be missed, with its skyline-dominating, crown-shaped spire. For shopping, historic Central Arcade is a great option. For a dose of Roman history, visit the surprisingly intact remains of Hadrian's Wall, built by the emperor's orders in the year 122. For art appreciation, consider the classic Laing Gallery, modern BALTIC Contemporary Art Center or the eclectic craft-and-café vibe of The Biscuit Factory. Newcastle will keep you busy.

OVERVIEW

Enjoy a captivating drive through Durham Dales, a pastoral wonderland only interrupted by the occasional tiny village – like the one you'll explore at your leisure. The Dales are a landscape of wild moorlands, rugged mountains and serene river valleys in the west of County Durham. Unbroken hilly expanses and country roads meandering through patchwork fields define the North Pennine region's immense beauty, while scattered villages and farms little changed from how they appeared

centuries ago create its historic interest. In verdant Derwent Valley, a vast reservoir attracts ardent sailors, fishermen and birdwatchers intent on spotting the greylag geese, teals and tufted ducks who congregate here in sizable numbers. In immensely scenic Blanchland village, the population count is not nearly as large – barely 150 souls reside among the medieval stone buildings in this hamlet so idyllic that period films are frequently shot here. With an hour or two to spend on your own, you'll get a delightful sense of what it's like to live in Blanchland – strolling its streets, interacting with the welcoming locals and soaking up the irrepressibly timeless atmosphere that prevails in this unspoiled corner of England.

- Enjoy a panoramic coach drive into Durham Dales, a landscape of moorlands, mountains and market towns.
- Travel along meandering country roads where sheep and cattle graze and the farms are centuries old.

OVERVIEW

Take in Newcastle's renowned surplus of architectural highlights on a driving tour of this riverfront city with ancient roots. The Romans, William the Conqueror, the Victorians and countless generations of university students have all left their marks here. So, too, did the ancestors of George Washington – whose stunning manor house you'll visit during this excursion. Washington Old Hall is a relatively modest-sized property, allowing for an intimate glimpse into America's first president's background; its beautiful Jacobean gardens – complete with their own honeybee hive – invite a relaxing stroll. A drive through Newcastle's impressive Victorian heart, known as Grainger Town, brings you past rows of stately Georgian buildings, many of them listed historic landmarks. Perched high atop a column along Grey Street is a monumental statue of Earl Grey, the English prime minister whose name is forever tied to a blend of tea originally devised to counteract the lime aftertaste of the water on his family estate. An even loftier landmark is the crown-shaped spire of St. Nicholas Cathedral, dominating Newcastle's skyline for the last 500 years. Driving by, you may even sight the grotesque Vampire Rabbit that stares out menacingly from an adjacent doorway.

OVERVIEW

Step back into another era at the Beamish Museum, where dozens of original buildings from the past are present. This captivating 300-acre attraction includes a wide array of historic structures, reassembled brick by brick in the open countryside to form an Edwardian town and colliery – complete with farms, railways, tramways, a co-op shop, a pub, a printer and a chapel. The result is a living museum of the early 1900s, where the townspeople wear period costumes and are employed in professions of their era. To set the proper tone for your visit, you'll begin with a delightful orientation ride by double-decker tram down Main Street. Then, with about two hours of free time, you can wander Beamish at will. Visit the stables, step inside the Motor & Cycle Works, stop in at the Sweet Shop where tempting confections are still made according to original recipes. Inside the bank, the currency is antique and the vaults are wisely located in the cellar, while the gruesome surgical equipment on display in the dentist's office might make you want to head for a cellar yourself. And the town railway station takes its visitors back to the start of the 20th century.

- Settle in for a relaxed drive into the Northumberland countryside to visit 300-acre Beamish Museum.
- Tour an entire open-air town of meticulously reconstructed structures from the 1800s and early 1900s.

OVERVIEW

Travel to iconic Alnwick Castle, real-life home of the Duke and Duchess of Northumberland and stand-in for Hogwarts School of Witchcraft and Wizardry in two Harry Potter films. Located an hour north of Newcastle near England's border with Scotland, this imposing 12th-century fortress brims with star quality inside and out. Owned by the Percy family for over 700 years, Alnwick – it's pronounced "Annick" – has undergone many home improvements over the centuries, including the addition of numerous towers, a moat and a luxurious Gothic residential wing. Inside, you'll encounter lavish rooms filled with period furniture, including a pair of ornate Cucci cabinets originally made for Louis XIV. The library holds nearly 14,000 books, some of them read by a Percy ancestor with too much time on his hands while imprisoned in the Tower of London. Masterworks by Canaletto, Van Dyck, Claude and Titian adorn the walls, and the Grand Staircase is made of solid Carrara marble, each 12-foot-long step carved from a single stone. The Alnwick grounds are just as breathtaking, as you'll discover on a stroll through the elaborate gardens and parkland. Overall, the atmosphere here would qualify as magical even without the Harry Potter connection.

- Settle in for a drive across pastoral Northumberland to visit a destination with star qualities.
- Tour Alnwick Castle, home to the Percy family for seven centuries and Hogwarts School for two films.
- Wonder at the spectacular marble staircase and wander among rooms brimming with museum-grade furnishings and paintings.

- Take a walk through Alnwick's parkland and imagine a pitched Quidditch battle taking place overhead.

ancient forts along its length. The hills west of Newcastle once marked the northern border of the Roman Empire in Britain. In 122 A.D., Hadrian decided a stout defensive wall was required in order to protect his territory from the barbarians to the north. Nearly 2,000 years later, sections of this impressive barrier are still standing along the small highway now known as Military Road. You'll trace its course, stopping at Heddon on the Wall to admire and photograph the longest and best-preserved stretch of Hadrian's imposing construction – originally 73 miles long and 15 feet high with a tower every third of a mile, but now mostly in remnants that keep marauding cows out of his ex-Empire. You'll also tour Chesters Roman Fort, one of the finest remaining examples of the garrisons erected at regular intervals along the wall. A stroll around its excavated officers' quarters, baths and steam room – warmed from underground – will spark your imagination as you contemplate what life must have been like for Hadrian's far-flung legionnaires.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Venture by coach into the rolling hills that once defined the Roman Empire's frontier border in England.
- Travel a road that parallels the course of Hadrian's Wall, erected nearly 2,000 years ago to keep the northern barbarians at bay.
- Visit Heddon on the Wall to take in the longest and most-intact stretch of this defensive barrier.
- Explore Chesters Fort, a well-preserved example of the Roman garrisons built along the wall.
- Stop at Housesteads viewpoint to see Chesters Fort once again, perched high on a now-distant ridge.

OVERVIEW

Feast your eyes on glorious landmarks as you visit Durham and tour its iconic 11th-century cathedral, arguably England's finest example of Norman architecture. Lying about an hour south of Newcastle, across a green rolling landscape, Durham seems to have lost all track of modern time. Even with a gaggle of university students in town to help keep things lively, little has changed over the centuries along Durham's winding, cobbled streets and the leafy banks of the River Wear that loops through town. One architectural gem above all stands out here: Durham Cathedral, built in 1093 to house the relics of St. Cuthbert and the Venerable Bede. You'll tour this dramatic UNESCO-listed structure, laden with superb design details including its carved nave pillars, bishop's throne, and stone rib vaulting – the first in any European cathedral. Even the later stained-glass windows are fantastic. Just nearby, beautiful cloisters and the grassy Palace Green offer views of Durham Castle. So immense it would be hard to miss, this building is another standout, one of the grandest Romanesque structures left in England. An hour or so of free time to explore the town's medieval streets introduces some delightful spontaneity to the experience.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Settle in for a drive through pastoral North East England to visit a medieval throwback.
- Tour UNESCO-listed Durham Cathedral, revered both for its relics of saints and its quintessential Norman design.
- Admire the dramatic volume and impressive design details of this venerable 11th-century landmark.
- Visit the cloisters and Palace Green for views of stunning Durham Castle, commissioned by William the Conqueror.
- Take some free time to wander Durham's picturesque cobbled lanes and riverbanks at your leisure.

OVERVIEW

Walk Edinburgh's glorious Royal Mile, the medieval thoroughfare that stretches from Edinburgh Castle to the Palace of Holyroodhouse. The walk will commence at the castle's esplanade in the shadow of the imposing fortress, the city's oldest building. While descending the Royal Mile, you will pass a litany of historical buildings such as Gladstone's Land, the former townhouse of a wealthy merchant that has been restored to its 17th-century splendor. You will also see Lady Stair's House, a literary museum dedicated to the works of Sir Walter Scott and Robert Louis Stevenson, both of whom were born in Edinburgh. Upon reaching the end of the street, you will enjoy free time, during which you might explore Holyroodhouse, the British monarch's official residence in Scotland. In the 18th century, famed novelist Daniel Defoe hailed the Royal Mile as "the largest, longest and finest street in the world." It remains extraordinary even today.

- Stroll the Royal Mile, the thoroughfare that links Edinburgh Castle and Holyroodhouse.
- Pass one historical building after another for an idea of city life through the centuries.
- Spend free time around Holyroodhouse, where you might tour the royal residence or shop.

OVERVIEW

Explore parts of Edinburgh that are often overlooked but shouldn't be, as these revitalized areas have become thriving destinations. For instance, Dean Village was once a separate section of town where many mill workers lived, and it still seems vastly different from busier Edinburgh. Highlights include a 19th-century residential building for the mill workers known as Well Court and Dean Bridge, which spans the Water of Leith. You will next explore Stockbridge, a village on the north edge of Edinburgh that is wonderfully bohemian and artsy. Landmarks include the Roman temple-inspired St. Bernard's Well, whose waters supposedly have medicinal qualities, and Stockbridge Colonies, a cluster of 19th-century stone homes that is really a village within a village. Then there is Leith, a port for more than 1,000 years. You might see what the largest swing bridge in the United Kingdom was once, a 17th-century signal tower that was originally a windmill and the statue of Roberts Burns.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Discover fascinating sections of Edinburgh known mostly to locals.
- Peruse Dean Village, a historical area of Edinburgh where grains were milled for 800 years.
- Explore the bohemian, artsy village of Stockbridge.
- See highlights such as a 17th-century signal tower that was originally a windmill in Leith.

gave birth to James VI – the King who united the thrones of Scotland and England in 1603. Returning to the present day, you'll travel by coach through Old Town, descending along the ridge known as the Royal Mile. The style is richly gothic with a distinctly Moorish flavor, and the home's substantial collection of old masters and family portraits is considered the finest in Wales outside Cardiff's National Museum. A recently restored Victorian kitchen and domestic rooms add further interest to your visit. The grounds are also an impressive example of classic estate living; discover their formal gardens, semi-wooded walks and a Victorian walled garden at your leisure following your guided tour of Penrhyn's interior.

Tendering ashore, your coach awaits to whisk you into

Its original owners, the de Pencarrow family, lost it after an abortive Cornish rising against an unjust levy on tin in 1497. Arriving at the home, the House Guides will take you on a private tour where you will first see the Inner Hall with its outstanding paintings. The home’s particularly lovely drawing room is the result of work done to improve parts of its interior in 1841. The beautiful rose-colored damask curtains that hang here were a gift from a relative, Captain George Ourry, who took them as part of his booty from a Spanish ship, which he captured off the Philippines in 1762. In the Music Room, some of the outstanding features are the Rococco ceiling, depicting the four seasons, and the fine moldings of birds, fruit and flowers which decorate the maple-grained paneling. Along with its fine furniture and ceramics - notably the Pencarrow family rose bowl - the house contains many family portraits, including that of the 18th century Cornish Member of Parliament Sir John Aubyn, identified by Prime Minister Walpole as the only member he could not bribe. In the elegant dining room, the painting above the mantle piece is that of Sir John Molesworth, who in 1771 co-founded the banking house which was to become the forerunner of our modern day Lloyds Bank. During your visit to Pencarrow, you will be treated to some coffee or tea, and there will be time afforded to wander at leisure in the extensive gardens. Here, a beautifully proportioned sunken Italian Garden is a prime feature, and there is a great rockery adjacent to it which was built using large blocks of granite carried from Bodmin Moor. All too soon, it will be time to re-board your coach for the transfer back to Fowey.
