OVERVIEW

Follow an Alaskan trail guide on an enlightening walk through the rain forest on a remote island in the Tongass National Forest. You will reach the island aboard a Seahawk boat that is specifically designed for these waters. A nature walk follows, during which the naturalist guide will describe the forest's botanical species. For instance, you will learn how the people of the Haida, Tlingit and Tsimshian nations use the red and yellow cedars for shelter, transportation and spiritual enrichment. Following the informative hike, you will cruise back, looking once again for marine life such as whales, Stellar sea lions and harbor seals. Don't forget to scan the skies for bald eagles and migrating seabirds.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Cruise to a remote island in a national forest.
- Look for marine life such as whales and sea lions.
- Follow a naturalist through a rainforest and learn about the plants.
- Gain an understanding of the Alaska native historic and current use of the forest.

PLEASE NOTE

This tour involves approximately one mile of walking over a wooden boardwalk and is recommended for guests in good physical condition. The tour is not available to guests who utilize a wheelchair, a walker, those with mobility concerns, or guests with back or neck problems. Guests must be able to climb down a ladder from the boat to the beach. Children under 18 years of age must be accompanied by an adult parent or guardian. Minimum weight to participate is 40 pounds in order to fit into the required life jacket, which must be worn throughout the marine portion of the tour. Only life jackets provided by the tour operator will be permitted. Rain jackets will be provided if necessary. Participants will be required to sign a liability waiver. Due to transit time, tour duration will be increased by 30 minutes when ships dock into downtown Ketchikan.

OVERVIEW

Delve into the fascinating culture of the indigenous people of Southeast Alaska by visiting authentic totem poles in the rainforest and paddling a canoe across a gorgeous mountain lake. As you wander through Totem Bight State Historical Park, you will see colorful, hand-carved totem poles and a large clan house similar to ones built in the early 19th century. The park offers a fascinating insight into the culture of the indigenous people, as will your experience on Lake Harriet Hunt, where you will board a 37-foot canoe patterned after the ones that the Tlingit and Haida built. The lake provides a beautiful setting for your paddling adventure because the dense forest comes to the edge of the water. In time, you will disembark for an Alaskan-style snack. You will have the opportunity to walk through an old-growth forest while the guide points out the most interesting flora and perhaps fauna.

OVERVIEW

Go deep-sea fishing with a captain and crew that know the prime fishing grounds and the best methods to catch plenty of salmon. Although countless species inhabit these waters, Ketchikan is the Salmon Capital of the World, so there is no better place to catch these highly prized sportfish. Once you reach a spot where the fish have been biting lately, you will begin trolling for salmon using a downrigger to ensure that the bait reaches the desired depth. All the fishing tackle is provided so you can just concentrate on landing a big one. Five species of salmon are found in this part of Alaska, including king salmon, which are also called Chinook salmon. Pink salmon are the most abundant species, and they are vigorous fighters. If you want to keep what you catch, it can be processed and shipped anywhere in the United States. Of course, be sure to snap lots of photos first.

- Fish for hard-fighting salmon in a small group of not more than six people.
- Enjoy the stunningly beautiful, natural backdrop of the Tongass National Forest.
- Ship your catch home fully processed if you want to eat it later.

PLEASE NOTE

Participants must be at least 5 years of age and weigh no more than 300 lbs. A fishing license (\$15) is required for ages 16 and up. An additional King salmon stamp (\$15) is recommended From June 15 through July and required for retention of King salmon. We highly recommend purchasing this in advance at store.adfg.alaska.gov Make sure to have a paper copy or pdf copy on your phone. Guest can also purchase onboard the boat with cash as payment. Weather appropriate clothing and comfortable walking shoes are recommended. There will be multiple rods in the water and there can be 4 -6 guests onboard depending on vessel. Anglers will rotate so that everyone has time fishing.

OVERVIEW

Try your luck fishing for halibut, a species of flatfish that gets massive and feeds voraciously in the summer. You will head out to the fishing grounds in a group of no more than six guests, which ensures that the captain and crew can provide exceptional personal attention to increase your chances of catching one of these behemoths. Once the boat anchors, you will fish with a vertical rigging to reach the bottom of the ocean floor where halibut live. The larger fish are usually females and can grow up to eight feet in length and five feet in width, which is why they are often called “barn doors.” Imagine what a thrill it would be to reel in one of these lunkers. If you catch one, you will notice that it has smooth scales and a light-colored bottom and a darker top, which acts as a natural camouflage that mimics the hues of the ocean floor and water.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Fish for halibut on a private boat with just five other guest's maximum.
- Follow the crew's advice and tips to increase your chance of catching a huge halibut.
- Ship your catch home fully processed if you want to eat it later.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

PLEASE NOTE

Participants must be at least 5 years of age and weigh no more than 300 lbs. A fishing license (\$15) is required for ages 16 and up. It is highly recommended to purchase the license in advance at store.adfg.alaska.gov. Make sure to have a paper copy or pdf copy on your phone. Guest may also purchase them on the boat with cash as payment. Guest may keep all legal fish caught on the trip. This season guided anglers may keep one halibut per person, per day, that must be under 37" or over 80". Halibut retention is not allowed on THURSDAYS during halibut season. You may also catch other species, and guest may retain all legal fish in addition. Operator works with a 3rd party fish processor called Gateway Smokehouse and Processing. Operator will facilitate delivery of the catch to them at the end of the trip. Credit card info is needed for fish processing. There will be processing forms onboard the boats. While on the Private Halibut Fishing tour, each guest will hold their own rod. There will be multiple rods in the water and there can be 4 -6 guests onboard depending on vessel. Anglers will rotate so that everyone has time fishing.

KTN-006 ALASKA FISHING & WILDERNESS DINING

OVERVIEW

Go fishing on an open-deck skiff in the pristine waters off Ketchikan and then gather around a crackling campfire and enjoy a classic Alaskan fish dinner. The captain will assess the water conditions and choose a secluded spot where you will have the best chance of catching numerous Alaskan bottom fish species. To add to the fun, you will use light tackle so even average-size fish will be more exciting to land. After a couple of hours on the water, you will disembark on the shore of a spruce and cedar rainforest and settle in while the camp cook prepares dinner. The bottom-feeders that you have caught will be served atop a saffron-infused bouillabaisse. Seasoned potatoes in homemade fish broth, warm sourdough rolls and rhubarb-blueberry crisp round out the menu.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Fish in the waters off Ketchikan in a skiff with only a few other anglers.
- Use the provided light tackle and bait that's been selected for what's biting that day.

- Enjoy your fresh catch for dinner around a campfire in the rainforest.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Dress in weather-appropriate clothing.
- Wear flat comfortable walking shoes.

PLEASE NOTE

Participants must be at least 5 years of age, weigh at least 30 lbs. and no more than 300 lbs. and be physically active. We recommended that you wear warm, layered clothing. Rain gear, rubber boots, comfortable float jackets, wool socks, hats, gloves, fishing equipment and tackle are provided. Actual fishing duration varies from 1.5 to 2.5 hours. Tour requires negotiating uneven terrain and the skiff is open to the elements. Alaska State Law requires a fishing license that can be purchased in cash at the outfitting room for \$15. This tour is perfect for serious adventurers or families seeking a personalized tour, this excursion is customized for your interest and skill level with just five or six guests per boat. Light tackle is our specialty, which ensures that even average sized fish are exciting and rewarding to bring aboard.

They come primarily to feed in the waters that are extraordinarily rich in halibut, salmon and plankton. Point Adolphus is noted for having the highest concentration of humpback whales in the Alaskan panhandle, so be on the lookout for these majestic and intelligent creatures. You can expect them to be breaching the water's surface, waving their flukes up and down as they dive, and feeding voraciously to fatten up for their winter migration south. You might also observe frolicking Dall's porpoises, Stellar sea lions, curious harbor seals and Orca whales. You may also see graceful bald eagles swooping down to grab fish in their talons, and perhaps even bears and deer in the surrounding wooded landscape.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Watch for humpback whales breaching the water's surface as they feed.
- Gain a deeper understanding of whales and other marine creatures from the naturalist.
- Look for playful porpoises, sea lions and harbor seals.

It's an amazing experience because halibut are longer than most flatfishes with a width one third of their length, so that husky girth produces a lot of resistance. You will spend approximately 2.5 hours on the water, fishing with bait that may include herring, salmon, and octopus, which is one of the halibut's favorite meals. If you catch one, you'll notice that halibut has smooth scales, a light-colored bottom side and a darker top. The colors are a natural camouflage that mimics the hues of the ocean floor and water. Not only are these waters home to halibut, but they are also filled with whales, sea lion, and seals so come prepared with your camera and binoculars. At the conclusion of your fishing time, you will head back to the pier where your tour concludes.

- Fish for mammoth halibut in an area where 100-pounders are often caught.
- Look for whales, sea lions and seals as you fish.

After returning to the beach at Icy Strait Point, you will turn in your equipment and head back to the ship, or perhaps visit the nearby Welcome Center.

One day non-resident licenses are \$15 per person. A king salmon stamp (\$15 per person) is required if you plan to target or retain this species.
