Saddle up and get your sense of wonder going full gallop on a scenic ride through the countryside outside Reykjavik on an Icelandic horse. On arrival at the riding center in Hafnarfjörður, you'll be geared up with overalls, riding helmet, boots and gloves – and introduced to your extremely sure-footed, keen and friendly Icelandic mount. Adorned with long, shaggy manes and thick coats, these purebred descendants of ancient Viking steeds and renowned for their good ride and gentle, calm disposition. Helgafell Volcano and the Kaldársel area, or remote and primal Lake Hvaleyrravatn, with the beautiful Blá fjöll Mountains as your companion on the horizon. Beyond the usual walk, trot and gallop, they know another unique gait: the tölt. It's a flowing four-beat gait where the rider stretches down in the stirrup, then sits back into the sensation of floating. The secure high steps involved let your Icelandic horse move easily over terrain that might stop other breeds in their tracks.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Head out by coach from Reykjavik pier to the Ishestar Riding Centre in Hafnarfjörður south of town.
- Get geared up and introduced to the shaggy, compact Icelandic horse – famed for its great riding qualities.
- Head out into the great outdoors, led by your guide, perhaps to the base of a volcano or the shores of a remote lake.
- Experience a unique gait that makes covering Iceland's rugged terrain effortless: the tölt.
- While in this memorable landscape, explore rough lava fields and learn about local reforestation efforts.

It is a breathtaking sight to see humpback whales acrobatically breaching the water's surface, waving their flukes up and down as they dive, and feeding to fatten up for their winter migration south. Minke whales are quite a bit smaller, but no less impressive. They have sharply pointed snouts that appear first when they breach. Although minke whales are typically solitary, they are inquisitive and are often spotted swimming alongside vessels or feeding beneath flocks of seabirds. OVERVIEW

Take a leisurely walk through Saint-Pierre, starting at the harbor, an area settled in the 17th century around cod fishing, which flourished for next 200 years. Named for Saint Peter, the patron saint of fishermen, Saint-Pierre has the look and feel of a rural French town. It's only natural as the teeny islands of Saint-Pierre and neighboring Miquelon comprise the last remaining French territory in North America. The official language is French, not Canadian French, and many of the streets and squares are named for French notables such as Jacques Cartier, Louis Pasteur and President Charles de Gaulle, who visited in 1967. Your walking tour will end at the Arche Museum, where you may take a self-guided tour or simply drop in to see the French guillotine. It was used once in 1889 and the townspeople were supposedly so horrified by the execution that the guillotine was retired.

- See the cathedral's stained-glass windows that French President Charles de Gaulle donated.

The British built the star-shaped citadel – officially named Fort George – atop a large hill in 1856 and it has been a fixture ever since. Dressed in a military uniform like the ones worn by the 78th Highlanders that first guarded the citadel, your guide will show you around the fortification, which is Canada's most visited National Historic Site. The citadel has been meticulously restored literally brick by brick since 1931, when it was no longer used for defensive purposes. During the tasting that follows, you will sample the three spirits. They include an amber rum similar to one 19th-century soldiers were given as a daily ration, a barrel-aged gin and a whisky made with Nova Scotia-grown grains.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Sample three spirits at Halifax Citadel, the 19th-century fortification.
- Learn how the spirits are produced from Nova Scotian ingredients.
- Receive an explanation of each spirit and its tasting notes.
- Tour the citadel with a guide dressed like a 19th-century 78th Highlander soldier.
